Let's just enjoy it while it lasts, because Ken Maumalo had one of his best games for us, David Fusitua is at the top of the try-scoring list, RTS is, well, RTS, Peta Hiku has given us a centre pairing alongside Solomone Kata that looks better than anything we have seen in a number of seasons, Blake Green is going superbly, and Shaun Johnson is a player any club would snatch your hand off to take.

Our forwards – powder-puffs for years – are revitalised. Props with fire in their bellies, Tohu Harris and Adam Blair adding legions of experience, Simon Mannering back, and Issac Luke looking like athe player we all knew he had the capability of being. Leivaha Pulu was a signing plenty of us wondered about, but he's been excellent, and Bunty Afoa has silenced the doubters.

It happens to the best of them.

Before Saturday night's loss, Greg Alexander took aim at JT, basically saying he's been around too long.

"I've seen players when they get too old. They hit the ground more often, they are easier to tackle, they've lost half a yard of speed. That's not to say he won't find his feet, but that's how he's playing at the moment. He looks half a yard off the pace."

I've seen players who have been around too long – and frankly, Greg Alexander was one of them when he came to the Warriors.

But it just goes to show you can be as wonderful a player as Thurston, and it does not exempt you from criticism.

Take A Bow Brian Smith

All sorts has been said and written about our quite remarkable turnaround, but one name frequently missing from the conversation is that of Brian Smith.

The well-travelled and hugely experienced Smith is our general manager of football, and he must be a huge influence and source of ideas for our coaching team. He was in the papers at the weekend talking to our old mate David Long at Stuff, saying he was determined the player drain to Australia could be stemmed.

We all know almost every side has a collection of Kiwi-born players.

We also know we cannot expect to keep every player, because there is just not enough room in our roster.

But we also know we have let go some who we should not have.

Our Under 20s were a breeding ground of talent that Aussie clubs cherry-picked for years, though we have been derailed of late, shifting emphasis away from the side, promoting players to reserve grade much faster than before.

Smith says Australian clubs have been picking up the best Kiwi players very early, sometimes as 14-year-olds.

"There is a player right now who is 14 and being courted by an NRL club with an offer that would blow your mind."

Smith was never backwards at coming forward, and he wants us to fight back, not just stand around and let it continue to happen, and to that end wants the club to be "more proactive" in identifying and recruiting the best young New Zealanders.

"We've got to get in and get dirty, if that's what it takes."

Seeing Double

I confess I was a bit worried by this double-header thing, because my Warriors companion is the wife, who enjoys immensely the spectacle of grown men belting along and scoring magnificent tries, and the physicality of the game.

At least that is what she tells me.

But given that I am never going to be accused of being a magnificent physical specimen, it may well be that her interest in the game is a bit more superficial than she lets on.

Two matches, I wrongly thought, might be a bit much for her, but she loved it.

ODAFONE WARRIORS head coach Stephen Kearney has retained a largely unchanged 21-man squad for the club's Old Boys' Day clash against original 1995 opponents the Brisbane Broncos at Mount Smart Stadium on Saturday (5.00pm kick-off; match day sponsor: Flava).

Already boasting an unprecedented 5-0 start to the season, the second-placed Vodafone Warriors face their third Queensland side in three games at Mount Smart Stadium having disposed of Gold Coast 20-8 on March 17 and North Queensland 22-12 in the second leg of last week's SKYCITY Auckland Double Header in front of the biggest regular season crowd (25,600) since 1995.

Kearney has named the same starting line-up used against the Cowboys while there are two changes on the extended eight-man bench.

Second rower Isaiah Papali'i returns after missing the last three rounds with a knee injury sustained in the second-round clash against the Titans and rookie hooker Sam Cook is also listed after being used in the Intrust Super Premiership in the last three weeks.

Super Saturday

SATURDAYS DON'T get more super than this one. Nine hours of television covering four games. It started with the Warriors NSW Cup team losing to a hot Western Suburbs Magpies outfit, leading into the memorable NRL double header at Mount Smart Stadium and finishing with another full house at Newcastle. Who would have thought the Melbourne Storm, North Queensland Cowboys and Brisbane Broncos would all be beaten in one day!

At last the Warriors have gone into a game against a quality opponent – boasting arguably the code's best back and best forward – as a co-favourite and won with conviction. Having the Storm and Wests Tigers playing the "curtain-raiser" helped of course, but the capacity crowd of 25,600 was largely testimony to the Warriors' brilliant start to their campaign. Ahead of them are four more tantalising home fixtures in the next five rounds.

Sure, it was not perfect. A Warriors' fumble when leading 18-0 just before halftime provided the Cowboys with a try-scoring chance that was not wasted and swept away their momentum. They never regained that control and made more errors in the second spell but their defence was again of the highest standard. It wilted only once despite Johnathan Thurston's scheming and involvement in nearly every play when his team had possession.

Thurston has not been at his incisive best since coming back from the injury which cut short his representative career and 2017 club season but the slick double around for the Cowboys' second try proved he cannot be left unguarded. In fact, Thurston was battered and bruised when taking the ball to the line and in bravely facing the onrushing Warriors forwards. The "other" JT, Jason Taumalolo, was restricted with enthusiastic multiple tackles.

I had Melbourne in my picks (what a hopeless cause they are this season) but still raised a fist pump when another ageing champion provided his Tigers with two more premiership points. Benji Marshall has only looked good in two jerseys – those of the Tigers and Kiwis – and the scene was set for him to kick the winning field goal. His presence has also been the making of halfback Luke Brooks. Marshall will be back to play the Warriors on May 5.

Hopefully the next New Zealand coach was watching the Mount Smart action. There were literally dozens of Kiwis on display. Tigers props Russell Packer and Ben Matulino relished their chance to take on countrymen Nelson Asofa-Solomona and Jessie Bromwich. But with the Kiwis' Test in Denver clashing with Tonga's Test at Campbelltown on June 23-24, what were Taumalolo and David Fusitu'a chatting about at fulltime in the second game?

Rejuvenated hooker Issac Luke is on course for a recall to play his 43rd Test against England but there was an interesting variation to the pecking order among the Knights at Newcastle. Slade Griffin retained his starting position but after 30 minutes he was joined on the field by 2017 World Cup Kiwi Danny Levi. Griffin had previously been used as a bench forward by Melbourne and has developed into a skilled and versatile all-round forward.

While spectators at Mount Smart had a unique chance to admire the ongoing influence that Marshall and Thurston still have on their teams, Newcastle fans (22,000 of them on Saturday) can anticipate years of thrills from brilliant fullback Kayln Ponga. Born in Western Australia but of New Zealand heritage, Ponga turned 20 last week. It is all too obvious why the Knights threw millions of dollars at him and Queensland worked so hard to gain his allegiance.

Also very obvious was just how much of an embarrassment disgraced Brisbane prop Matt Lodge is to the game. The booing whenever Lodge carries the ball is getting louder at every Broncos away game, rising to a crescendo in Newcastle. The rugby league public clearly believes Lodge has not paid his dues (or the court-ordered compensation) for his drunken home invasion in the United States. But are Todd Greenberg and the NRL listening?

Memories Of 1974 Christchurch Games

ATCHING THE Commonwealth Games from the Gold Coast inevitably brings back memories of those held in my Christchurch home town in 1974. They were exciting times for a city which seemed much less complicated than the still very earthquake-mangled one in which we now live. Attitudes to sport were different then too, and thousands volunteered to make them the Friendly Games and the success they undoubtedly were.

I was just starting my second decade at The Press newspaper and, because rugby league, cricket and yachting were not Games sports, I was assigned to assist the regular athletics reporter. Just to keep me busy the boss added amateur wrestling to my assignments. It meant some long days, from the morning track and field sessions at QEII in the eastern suburbs to several nights at the wrestling at the Town Hall in the city centre.

They were contrasting assignments. Athletics is the prime spectator attraction at all Games, whether Commonwealth or Olympic, while wrestling appeals only to its most enthusiastic adherents. So I spent my days in a stadium which was filled to capacity for the major track finals, and some of my nights in a near empty auditorium - or as an old classical music critic used to write, among "a small but appreciative audience".

While I will never forget Dick Tayler's heroics in the opening-day 10,000m, there are three other memories which have stayed with me just as vividly, two of them from the track and field and the other from the wrestling. They involve brilliant 1500m runners Filbert Bayi and John Walker, burly discus thrower Robin Tait, and an unknown wrestler who was later to achieve fame in a far more familiar sport to New Zealanders.

Bayi and Walker were always going to be headliners at the 1974 Games. The brilliant Bayi hailed from Tanzania, somewhere in darkest Africa, and New Zealand golden boy Walker was on the verge of international fame. Bayi paid no heed to his emerging rival or anyone else as he cruised to a comfortable lead and effortlessly ran a solo world record. Walker chased him all of the way up the straight without threatening to catch him.

Unlike Tayler's heroics, the man in black did not win

and the race ended in disappointment for many locals, including our athletics reporter. It took a couple of nudges with my elbow to turn his attention to the scoreboard, where Bayi's time bettered the previous world record. What a shame Bayi and Walker did not clash at the 1976 Olympics in Montreal, boycotted by the African nations because of the All Blacks tour to South Africa.

In contrast to the pencil slim Bayi, Aucklander Robin Tait was a bear of a man. But he was just as dominant in the discus. Tait biffed the disc out a great distance three times, knew he could not be overtaken and declined his last three throws. If any of his opponents still harboured gold medal aspirations they were shattered psychologically by Tait's cheerful air of confidence as he relaxed in the Christchurch sun.

It was the highlight of Tait's long career, which included appearances at six Commonwealth Games from 1962 to 1982, when he carried the New Zealand flag. But it angered him that only the glamour track athletes made money in those "amateur" days (he said so at his 1974 press conference) and he openly used steroids in an era when they were not illegal. Sadly, he died in 1984, aged only 43, and those steroids were almost certainly a factor.

The 1974 Games wrestling tournament was virtually a showdown between India and Canada, with the others grappling for bronze medals. An exception was Auckland green keeper David Aspin who won the middleweight gold. However, it was the super heavyweights I remember most though there were only five entrants. The Australian, New Zealander and Scotsman were outclassed by the top two but there were three medals at stake.

After a bye, the 22-year-old New Zealander was pinned by the Canadian before he and the Scotsman were both disqualified for passivity. Yet somehow he "won" the bronze. The liaison officer asked the media if we wanted a press conference but no hands were raised. What could we ask? In 1974 no-one had heard of Gary Knight. A year later he debuted at prop for Manawatu and in 1977 he played the first of his 36 Tests for the All Blacks.

Milestones

T WAS pleasing to see the records of two high quality Rugby League men recognised last weekend. Dragons and Kiwi winger, Jason Nightingale, played his 250th first grade match, while the Melbourne Storm's Craig Bellamy reached the 400 first grade games coached mark. Now 31, Jason was born in Sydney to New Zealand parents. He is of Maori descent and lived in Waikato for a few years as a small boy. When the family moved to Sydney he grew up in the southern suburbs and began playing junior Rugby League with the Renown United junior club. He came into grade with the Dragons in 2005 and in that first season scored a try in the Dragons Jersey Flegg (under 20s) 30-20 win over Parramatta in the Grand Final at ANZ Stadium on 2 October. The next year he won the award as the Dragons under 20 player of the year and on 4 May 2007, at Kogarah Oval he made his first grade debut, scoring one of St. George/Illawarra's five tries in the 28-16 win over the Panthers. When he ran on to Kogarah Oval last Friday night, 6 April, for his 250th first grade match in 12 seasons wearing the red and white jersey, he became the fourth member of an exclusive club. Only four players have played 250 first grade games, won a first grade Premiership (2010), scored more than 100 first grade tries (he has 109) and played more than 30 Tests. Jason has now joined three Australians- Brad Fittler, Darren Lockyer and Billy Slater- in this illustrious group. He made his Test debut for the Kiwis in the Centenary Test at the Sydney Cricket Ground on 9 May 2008 and played the last of his 32 Tests in last year's World Cup, when he scored two tries in the 74-6 win against Scotland at Christchurch on 4 November 2017. Jason has 17 Test tries on his CV. In October 2008, Jason played for the Maori against the All Golds at New Plymouth and in February 2012 on the Gold Coast, he was a member of the NRL All Stars team which defeated the Indigenous All Stars 36-28. Married to Bianka in December 2014, the couple have a two year old daughter.

Craig Bellamy joined Wayne Bennett, Tim Sheens, Brian Smith, Warren Ryan, Bob Fulton and Ron Willey in the 400 club at Mt. Smart on Saturday. He has 271 wins and two draws from the 400 games in his 16 seasons as Head Coach of the Storm. With a winning percentage of nearly 68, Bellamy has the best win percentage of all seven coaches in the 400 club. He was Dally M Coach of the Year in 2006, 2007 and 2011, as well as the Rugby League International Federation (RLIF), Coach of the Year in 2009 and 2012. He took the Storm to Grand Final wins in 2007, 2009, 2012 and 2017, although the club were stripped of the 2007 and 2009 Premierships because of salary cap breaches. Now 58, he coached NSW in State of Origin football from 2008 to 2010 and Country Origin in 2005, 2006 and 2007. Born at Portland. 167 kms north west of Sydney over the Blue Mountains, Bellamy played 148 first grade games with the Canberra Raiders from 1982 to 1992, including the winning 1990 Grand Final (18-14 over Penrith).

There were several other milestones last weekend and these included passing the 800 first grade points mark for Shaun Johnson. He now has 803 points (59 tries, 278 goals, 11 field) goals from his 147 matches.

The latest NRL statistics indicate that the Warriors should continue their winning run when they take on the Broncos at Mt. Smart this Saturday. The Warriors are well in front of Wayne Bennett's side in most of the NRL team numbers. They lead the post contact...

... metres with 2,510 metres in their five games, while the Broncos are not in the top four. That is a telling stat and it shows that this season the Warriors have averaged 502 metres per game after the first defensive player had made contact with the ball carrier. Other positive numbers for the Warriors are that they are second on the linebreaks table and third on both tackle busts and running metres. The Broncos led the most tackle count table but that is because they often turned the ball over. They are third on the error count table and fifth on handling errors. There is one area of concern for the Warriors team and that is the penalties conceded table where they are fifth with 45 against them. They gave away 8 in their good win on Saturday while the Cowboys were penalised 7 times. Given good weather on Saturday, the crowd should go close to the Mt. Smart record for a Rugby League game of 30,003 which was set at the World Cup Tonga-England semi final in November last year. If the Warriors defeat the Broncos and the Dragons continue on their winning way at Wollongong on Friday night against the Sharks, get in early for your tickets for next Friday night (20 April) when the two sides clash at Mt. Smart as unbeaten competition leaders. Watching the Warriors beat the Cowboys on TV it was obvious that there was plenty of atmosphere at Mt. Smart. No doubt this was much better being at the game and it will be even better this week when the Broncos visit.



THERE ARE certain players who, whether by strength of personality or style of play, become a cult hero at a club. Vodafone Warrior No. 10 became a cult hero at two clubs on opposite sides of the world. That man was 'Nitro' Hitro Okesene.

Of Samoan heritage but born in Auckland, Okesene was a block-busting front-rower who started his league journey with local club Manukau. As a young man he had aspirations to travel and maximise his league potential and pestered his Manukau coach, Cameron Bell (father of Dean Bell) to see if he could sort him an overseas contract. Bell had strong connections with Carlisle so at the age of 18 Okesene was playing half the year for Manukau and the other half for Carlisle.

After 3 seasons of travelling to the Northern Hemisphere he settled back in New Zealand and signed for Counties Manukau, where he played alongside his brother Paul. He captained them in the 1994 Lion Red Cup, leading them to the minor premiership and to the Grand Final where they lost 24-16 to North Harbour. His form was dynamic and he was rated the best hooker in the competition. It was this form that made the fledgling Warriors take notice and sign him.

He was in the starting line-up in the first game against Brisbane in 1995 but was used as a prop with Duane Mann starting at hooker. Originally signed as a back-up hooker to Mann he got his start at prop due to an injury to Andy Platt. It was a special moment for Okesene as he recalls fondly "I remember the lady in the tunnel, trying to organise us before we came out. I remember the fire, a massive haka and everyone cheering. You couldn't hear anything else. It was a great experience – it was awesome. Then seeing, on the other side, these Broncos, who I'd watched on telly. And now we were lining up against them. It was a great thing".

Friend and team-mate Stacey Jones felt that being played out of his favoured position limited his time at Mt Smart "He could have stayed at the Warriors longer than he did," Jones says "He ended up going hard on the weights - we all did that year - and was turned into a prop. I think his best value was as a hooker or even a second rower when he was trimmed down a bit. He was outstanding in 1994 - the best hooker on the domestic scene. The way he was playing then he could have put a lot of pressure on for hooker's job with the Warriors."

However it was as prop that he endeared himself to the Warriors' fans. His powerful runs, with his mullet flying, were a sight to behold and even today he retains a cult status. His total commitment was also apparent as skipper Dean Bell said of him "You were never in doubt that he'd play to his very best and that enabled him to reach the heights of playing for the Warriors and also representing the Kiwis. He certainly got the best out of himself."

Okesene scored his first try in round 10, notching the match-winner against the Cronulla Sharks but after 3 seasons and just 22 games he returned to the north of England. He played a season for Hull then Featherstone Rovers before a short stint with a Catalan XIII in France once again joining up with brother Paul (who passed away from a heart attack at the tragically young age of 44 in 2012).

In 2001 he signed for Workington Town where he was to spend the next 4 years. Just as he had with the Warriors, Okesene earned the undying love of the Town fans. His "up the guts" style was tailor-made for the down to earth folk of Cumbria and the fact he had started his career in the county and had returned also endeared him to the locals.

He played 93 games for Workington scoring 10 tries. He also made international appearances for 3 countries, Western Samoa, American Samoa and New Zealand.

A family man at heart (he met his wife Donna during one of his early trips to Cumbria) he was living in his parents garage in Mangere when he was signed by the Vodafone Warriors and now lives in Aspatria, Cumbria with Donna and his 3 children, Shakayla, Giavanna and Lerocco and works in the construction industry.

Well established and liked in his local community Okesene is comfortable, enjoying life and his family and grateful for what rugby league has given him "I'm blessed," he says. "Nah, that's corny. I'm thankful, really. Life's all good."

NZRL Confirms Preparations On Track For Test In Denver

PREPARATIONS FOR the Kiwis' ground-breaking Test against England in Denver are coming together nicely, New Zealand Rugby League confirms.

The RLIF sanctioned match scheduled to be held on 23 June at Mile High Stadium will bring international rugby league to North America for the first time. With planning stages of the fixture in full-swing, NZRL can confirm the players' insurance policy was also locked in last week.

Players selected to represent their country while in Denver will continue to receive benefits that mirror the current NRL representative, State of Origin and ANZAC Test insurance policies in place. They will also receive the extra insurance required for playing in the United States.

In addition to medical concerns being allayed by Doctor, Greg Macleod, the confirmation of the insurance policy was another essential part of the planning stages that ensures the players will be well looked after.

Ample due diligence and player welfare is always at the forefront of planning for Tests in any part of the world and Kiwis Manager Nadene Conlon says the Test in Denver is no different.

"There's always a lot of preparation that goes into any fixture the Kiwis play in, whether it's a Test or a tour, and travelling overseas, regardless of where it is means the same rigorous processes are undertaken," Conlon says.

"Of course playing in Denver brings with it some unique considerations but having experts on board like Greg Macleod allows us to be prepared in the best possible manner," she says.

West Tigers co-captain Elijah Taylor and Warriors prop Adam Blair are a couple of the Kiwi eligible players who say excitement for the Test in Denver is brewing among the player networks.

"Pulling on the Kiwis jersey is always an honour and privilege – it's the pinnacle for any New Zealand Rugby League player,"

"Any opportunity I get I'll grab with both hands and I'm 100 percent committed to every Kiwi game wherever it's played,"

"I understand the NRL clubs have concerns about playing in Denver, so it's great to see the player insurance has been sorted for the Test, along with Doctor Macleod's reassuring words that the conditions over there don't increase our chances of injury,"

"In the camps I've been a part of with the Kiwis, we've been well looked after and I expect the Test in Denver will be no different,"

"If the Kiwis have future games in the Pacific Islands or Europe, I will be just as committed to making the Kiwis squad if given the privilege to play for my country," Kiwi #770 Taylor says.

Kiwi #732 and RLPA Director Adam Blair adds, "everything looks like it's falling into place and I'm excited not only for the international game but for NZRL as this is a great opportunity to show case our game in America."


