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Tuivasa-Sheck playing 50th game for club

APTAIN ROGER Tuivasa-Sheck takes some of the best form of his career into his 50th appearance for the Vodafone Warriors in Sunday's vital 23rd-round NRL encounter with the Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs (2.00pm kick-off local time; 4.00pm NZT).

The 25-year-old fullback leads an unchanged side in the quest for a third straight victory following wins over St George Illawarra (18-12) and Newcastle (20-4).

He ran a staggering 338 metres against the Knights last Friday night, following on from 239 against the Dragons, 160 against Gold Coast and 229 against the Storm. His total is a club record topping two 300-metre plus efforts by former Vodafone Warriors captain Steve Price in 2007.

Tuivasa-Sheck's effort last week is a mere one metre less than his career best (339 against Cronulla in 2015) while he also made 330 and 303 in two other games that same season. The NRL record is Justin Hodges' 346 in 2006.

In 19 matches this season Tuivasa-Sheck has totalled almost 3500 metres averaging more than 183 a game and has made a total of 100 tackle breaks.

On a night when the Vodafone Warriors made more than 2000 metres overall, Tuivasa-Sheck combined with the rest of the back five for total of almost 900 metres.

On Sunday he'll lead the Vodafone Warriors in search of their 14th win of the season to match their best record in the last 15 years (they had 14 regular season wins in 2011 and 2010 while the best returns in the club's history have been 17 wins in 2002 and 15 in 2003).

The Canterbury-Bankstown contest also gives the

Vodafone Warriors the opportunity to extend their club record for away wins in one season to nine.

The first four players named on the interchange also remains unchanged with utility Jazz Tevaga joined by second rower Leivaha Pulu, prop Bunty Afoa and utility back Peta Hiku.

The only clash of the season against the Bulldogs will be just the second against the club in Sydney since 2010.

The Vodafone Warriors sit seventh on the ladder on 28 points with a 13-8 record while the Bulldogs are 14th on 14 points, the same total as Parramatta in 15th and the North Queensland Cowboys in 16th.

In 36 meetings, the Vodafone Warriors have 14 wins and the Bulldogs 20 with two draws.

The Vodafone Warriors have won two of the last three contests but the Bulldogs have a 6-4 edge in the last 10 encounters and a 10-5 advantage (with two draws) in clashes at home.

IWIS AND St George Illawarra Dragons wing Jason Nightingale, 31, will be in rich company when he hangs up his high-flying boots at season's end. Only a select group – comprising Bob Fulton, Greg Inglis, Darren Lockyer, Brad Fittler and the also-retiring Billy Slater – can count more than 250 NRL appearances, over 30 Test matches, at least 100 NRL tries and one or more NRL premierships.

Nightingale has played 265 games for the Dragons, second only to Ben Hornby's 273-match club record -- and that also incorporates the separate St George and Illawarra Steelers entities before they were amalgamated. Nightingale stepped down from international football after 33 Tests (plus one other tour game) for New Zealand between his 2008 debut and last year's World Cup clash with Scotland.

Fittingly for one who soared across the line for many of his tries, Nightingale's Kiwis number is 747. His 110 Dragons tries have been bettered only by Matt Cooper and Brett Morris while his 19 Test tries rank him second equal with Nigel Vagana behind Manu Vatuvei (22). The premiership triumph came in 2010, when Nightingale touched down twice in the 32-8 Grand Final victory over the Sydney Roosters.

The Dragons have awarded Nightingale every individual trophy within their club during his 12 seasons in the top grade, including Player of the Year in 2011. He shared in the Kiwis' 2008 World Cup success, when his sole appearance was a try-scoring one against England, and was again among the scorers when New Zealand beat the Kangaroos to win both the 2010 and 2014 Four Nations finals.

Weighing little more than 70kg when he cleared junior ranks, Nightingale was always competing against much bigger rivals and took time to consolidate his place on the New Zealand right wing. He first played in the losing ARL Centenary Test at the Sydney Cricket Ground in 2008 and replaced an injured Brent Webb in the World Cup squad later that year. The 2018 Media Guide lists Nightingale at 91kg.

Although widely regarded as a specialist wing, Nightingale has also proved a worthy fullback option in emergencies. Earlier this season Dragons coach Paul McGregor shocked fans – and possibly Nightingale – by using him off the bench among the forwards in midfield. A willing Nightingale took a pummelling on occasions, suffering a neck injury, but never flinched from his philosophy of "team first".

"I found a lot of motivation in not wanting to let people down," Nightingale told NRL.com. "That is something I am proud of myself for being able to do. I love the game. I don't love wing or fullback as a preference, I just love the game. I love tackling people and I love being tackled. I love contact." His try-scoring deeds made headlines, but his courage on defence and under the high ball equally wowed his team-mates.

Nightingale modestly claimed he would have failed miserably at individual sports, supporting his pride in "team first" and in wearing only one jersey since first pulling on the Red V as a 15-year-old junior. From there he advanced to club and international fame, never more so than in 2010 when his Grand Final and Four Nations triumphs led to selection in the Rugby League World magazine Team of the Year.

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St George Illawarra officials offered Nightingale another season but, typically, he looked around at the promising youngsters challenging for first grade selection and decided to step aside. "Team first" after all. He will join fellow illustrious retirees Jonathan Thurston, Billy Slater, Simon Mannering, Luke Lewis, Ryan Hoffman, Sam Thaiday and Chris Heighington after the final whistle is blown on the 2018 season.

Duane Fyfe Returns To CRL

REAGUE in Canterbury received its best news for a long time with the appointment of Duane Fyfe as the new CRL chief executive officer. Fyfe is effectively returning to the job he filled from 2004 to 2008, when the position was known as general manager, before travelling extensively overseas. He starts early next month.

A near musical chairs situation has existed for the last decade, with the role most recently filled by former Olympic women's hockey representative Shane Collins. She resigned at the annual general meeting a few weeks ago. Fyfe's most recent appointments have been with Rugby League Northland and Touch Canterbury.

Fyfe is a real rugby league man, to the extent that he found links with the sport in some most unlikely countries during his travels. In the past he has managed New Zealand Army, Junior Kiwis and New Zealand Residents teams and, as the CRL press release pointed out, he has a deep understanding of the game at all levels.

"CRL are very fortunate to obtain Duane for the CEO role, where he can bring both rugby league knowledge and business background to the game," said CRL chairman Simon Doig. "Duane will be working closely with the clubs and key stakeholders in developing the new strategy forward for CRL in the first few months."

Rugby league in Canterbury is literally at a crossroads. A century-old association with its spiritual home in Addington is about to be ended as it looks towards a move to a new sports complex down the road in 2019. The CRL office has had four homes in seven years, another symptom of what has been an orphan sport.

While the citizens of Christchurch have been bombarded by the Canterbury Rugby Union's increasing distaste for the "temporary" AMI Stadium and with claims it desperately needs a \$500 million dollar covered "multi-purpose" facility, it is actually rugby league which has been homeless since the 2010-11earthquakes.

AMI Stadium was Rugby League Park (and before it the Addington Show Grounds), a strip of turf which traces back to the 13-a-side code's very first game in the city in 1912 and where it became the A and P Association's permanent winter tenant in 1951. The CRL held a lease with the Christchurch City Council through to 2040.

Whereas the CRL had previously struggled to convince its city council landlord to carry out even basic maintenance before the earthquakes, the council and the previous Government had no hesitation in annexing it to replace the ruined Lancaster Park. Within 100 days they spent \$20 million to give the Crusaders a home venue.

Rugby union fans were initially thrilled to have a rectangular field which brought them close to the action. More recently they have condemned its basic construction. Crusaders officials have contradicted themselves by rubbishing the venue while simultaneously trying to attract spectators to poorly-attended playoff matches.

Rugby league has been able to play most of its provincial games and two NRL fixtures there. But last August the CRL grand final was shunted out to suburban Linfield Park – home of the Linwood rugby union club – with the excuse Christchurch had experienced a wet winter. Yet no games were played at AMI for weeks either side of it.

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There is no chance that rugby league will ever return to its traditional home. The council has included it along with athletics, tennis and hockey at a new Nga Puna Wai sports complex. Ironically, the facility is positioned alongside Canterbury Agricultural Park, where the A and P Association moved from Addington in 1997.

As with everything else in Christchurch's rebuild, several proposed Nga Puna Wai openings failed to materalise. But last week it was announced the international standard athletics track had been completed and would stage the national championships for the next two summers. Twelve outdoor tennis courts had also been laid.

Two international water-based hockey pitches are also nearing completion, and we were told the two rugby league fields would be ready for the 2019 season. One of them will have a smallish grandstand, with reported seat numbers seemingly dwindling over time from 600 to about 440, and some grassed embankments.

While it will undoubtedly be pristine on opening, it is much smaller than its predecessor. The Show Grounds in their prime accommodated crowds in excess of 12,000, with seating for about 4400. By giving rugby league a mini-replacement, maybe the powers-that-be want us to join the call for a big new covered stadium!

The 2018 grand final is being billed as a farewell to club football at "Rugby League Park" and will feature Linwood, one of the original four clubs from 105 years ago. Linwood beat Northern 48-10 in the major semi-final, while Hornby beat Halswell 50-6 in the minor semi. Northern and Hornby clash in this Saturday's preliminary final.

Grand final Day is scheduled for Sunday, August 26, with the women's match at 1pm and Linwood and either Hornby or Northern contesting the Pat Smith Challenge Trophy at 3pm. It will be a poignant occasion. Thousands of rugby league club players have spilt sweat and blood, and known triumph and despair, on that patch of dirt.

THE NRL coaching merry go round is big new in the Australian media. The sporting pages in last Sunday's Sydney papers were full of stories about the future of four coaches. Wayne Bennett, Trent Barrett and Ivan Cleary were prominent in the papers, while there was also plenty of discussion about who will coach the Panthers after Anthony Griffin's abrupt sacking last week. At the Broncos, Bennett seems to have the support of his playing group but not the administrators of the club. This came to the surface several weeks ago when stories circulated that the Storm's Craig Bellamy was on Brisbane's wish list for 2019. Bennett turns 69 on 1 January but is keen to continue coaching for a few more seasons. Some media people have suggested that the Brisbane coach could end up at the Panthers but I believe this to be very unlikely, mainly because I cannot see a working relationship between Penrith supremo, Phil Gould and Bennett lasting too long. After the Tigers tight 22-20 win over the Raiders on Sunday, Bennett will be under plenty of pressure to keep his team in the top eight. The Broncos could lose their next two games, against Souths in Brisbane this Thursdaynight and then with the Roosters in Sydney nine days later on 25 August. The Tigers also have two tough matches in their last three. They meet the Dragons this week, then Manly and finish the regular season on Thursday night 30 August against South Sydney.

Barrett at 40 years of age is a different story. He has plenty of coaching in front of him. He has a background at Penrith, joining the club in October 2012 as an assistant to the then Panthers head coach, Ivan Cleary. Now in his third season with Manly, the Sunday papers reported that Barrett was unhappy with at Manly because of the lack of football resources. He still has two years left on his current contract, but if his off-field support from Manly was not up to scratch, it would be a way out for him. If this happened, Penrith would be a quick solution for both the Panthers and Barrett.

Soon after Griffin's dismissal, Wests Tigers head coach, Ivan Cleary, was mentioned as a possible replacement. This resulted in plenty of anger and even disgust throughout most of the Rugby League community that Cleary might break his current contract which lasts until the end of 2020. In the past few days, Cleary has released a statement confirming that he would honour his agreement with the Tigers and that he had not received a formal approach from Penrith. Gould too has played down any offer, saying it was an innocent discussion about Cleary's long term future. To many it seems amazing that Cleary, now 47 years of age, would be interested in returning to the club where he was sacked by Gould in October 2015. Still with his son, Nathan, playing with the Panthers, it is understandable and natural, that the two would like to work together. In my opinion, there is plenty about what is happening at Penrith that has not been made public.

Griffin has said that he has plenty of support following his axing. In a story on Sunday, he revealed that he had received texts from almost every Penrith player, including a lovely message from Nathan Cleary. Despite these messages, it does not confirm that the players were happy with his coaching methods. Griffin also received messages from other first grade coaches such as Trent Robinson (Roosters), Anthony Seibold (Souths) and the Warriors coach, Stephen Kearney, as well as leading Rugby League identities, Darren Lockyer, Wally Lewis, Todd Greenberg, Bart Campbell and Dennis Watt.

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He also received a message of support from Wallaby coach, Michael Cheika. No doubt there are still several twists and turns to come from the Griffin situation. Why did Penrith resign him just last November until the end of 2020? It will be a large amount needed to pay out Griffin and also sign a new coach. No wonder the NRL is concerned about the spending of clubs. Cameron Ciraldo, 33, will coach the Panthers for the remainder of this season and I believe he will also be given the reigns next year, unless Ivan Cleary miraculously becomes available.

With three games to go before the playoffs, I believe the teams currently in the top eight will remain in this position. Brisbane appears vulnerable and the Tigers have put themselves in a position to move into the eight. But the Tigers probably have to win their last three games to make the cut and this will not be easy. After last weekend's round, five of the top eight teams appear to be in good form at the business end of the season, while the other three are not playing near their best. The Roosters were good in their 18-14 win over Souths on Friday night and despite the loss, Souths were not too far behind them. The Warriors were good against the Knights, while the Sharks were methodical against the Storm. The Storm were not at their best but they are still hard to beat. Watching the Storm-Cronulla game on TV, I was alarmed at several arm grabs which were close to chicken wing tackles. One of these by a Storm forward on Josh Duggan, five minutes before halftime, was alarming to me but did not bother the two on-field touch judges or the two touch judges. On the other side of the ledger, the Broncos lost their second successive game, while the Dragons were poor and have injury worries about Gareth Widdop. I know the Panthers got out of gaol to beat the Titans and their come-from-behind record lately has been impressive. But when they come up against the top sides they will have problems in doing this and unless they can play better in the first hour or so of their matches, they will be beaten.

The media are rightly giving plenty of credit to the Warriors back three of Roger Tuivasa-Sheck, David Fusitu'a and Ken Maumalo. Knights halfback, Mitchell Pearce, complemented this trio after the Warriors win at Mt. Smart on Saturday. But there are also many other dangerous players in the team. The skill of Shaun Johnson, Issac Luke and Blake Green will be prominent in the games ahead, while the forwards as a unit are certainly doing their job. The Warriors defence in their last two games has been very impressive. Warrior Stats from the Knights game that interested me were the 727 post contact metres, the 45 tackle breaks and the 90 percent tackle effective rate. On the negative side, they lost the penalty count for the ninth successive game, this time 7-6.

The Bunker was at it again on Saturday. At the Gold Coast, on Saturday In the Titans-Panthers game, they corrected a call from a line drop out to a seven tackle 25 metre tap and that was good. But earlier in the game, they did not interfere to change an incorrect scrum feed call by the referees. Both these decisions favoured the Panthers.

It seems the NRL is well down the track now to begin next season in Los Angeles on 9 March. The game seems likely to be between Souths and Manly and the NRL are hopeful of using the star power of Souths owner, Russell Crowe and Manly supporter, Hugh Jackman, in promoting the clash in the American market.

Good luck to the All Blacks for their game against Australia in Sydney this Saturday!





TAMATEA SECONDROWER Joe Taafi scored four tries in Saturday's opening round of Hawke's Bay's premier men's rugby league competition.

Taafi's 16-point haul came in Tamatea's 40-22 win against Omahu Huia at the Hawke's Bay Regional Sports Park in Hastings. Rugby League Hawke's Bay draw master Mike Tamati has placed all seven senior men's teams in the premier comp for the start of the season and he will divide them into premier and reserve grade divisions once he gauges the calibre of the teams. As has been the case for more than a decade in the Bay the province's league competitions are played during spring to avoid a clash with the club rugby comps.

One of Taafi's secondrow partners, Mark Ioane, was also prominent for Tamatea. He kicked four goals and was just as powerful at centre as he was during his minutes as a forward.

Standoff Haisley Robson directed the Tamatea backline well. Johnny Saifiti, Te Rira Rowlands, Jordarn Harmer and former Hawks basketballer Mataeus Marsh were the other tryscorers for Tamatea.

"We did well for a team we just managed to scrape together," Omahu Huia coach Aki Renata said.

"We lost six players to Bridge Pa and several are busy with rep rugby so we are virtually starting all over again. We were competing well until we lost Taniera [standoff Miratana] with a hamstring injury midway through the second half," Renata added.

His best players were hooker Eddie Miratana and winger Ivan Renata.

Other games saw Bridge Pa A beat Maraenui 42-

18, Dannevirke Tigers pip Bay Bulldogs 40-36 and Bridge Pa B beat Flaxmere 32-20. Premier champions Kahuranaki had the bye on Saturday.

Bridge Pa A player-coach Ihaka Waerea has recruited well in his quest to improve on last year's second placing. But he only gave Saturday'sperformance a 5/10.

Former Napier Panthers secondrower Leroy Taiapa impressed in the Bridge Pa pack. Captain and centre Jeston Craig and winger Roger Paewai, who made his debut for Bridge Pa after transferring from Omahu, were dangerous attackers in the Bridge Pa backline.

Maraenui are coached by the Bay's most successful premier club coach, 78-year-old Waka Leonard, and they had former Hawke's Bay Strongest Man competition winner Sam Magele playing at prop.

"Sam was a beast. Our boys really struggled to contain him," Waerea said.

Waerea was rapt all three of the Bridge Pa sides won on Saturday. Bridge Pa, the defending champions in the women's grade, who are coached by Leonard's son and former Hawke's Bay Unicorns player and coach Alan Mason, opened their campaign with an 85-10 walloping of Hastings Rugby and Sports.

The other women's game saw Tamatea hand new-comers YMP an 88-0 drubbing. YMP missed six players who had rugby commitments in Wairoa and the bulk of their players were new to league.

Wests Tigers had lost 4 on the trot and were surely destined for a miserable season but have now won 4 of their last 5 to lie just outside the top 8, two points behind the Brisbane Broncos who have lost their last 2. The Melbourne Storm had won 8 straight and looked sure to be minor premiers but back to back losses sees them now in 3rd and 2 points off the top of the table. My beloved Dragons had been top of the table and demolishing sides left right and centre but have now lost 5 of their last 6, including a shameful 40-4 battering by then bottom of the table Eels (who by the way were certain wooden-spooners but have now won 3 of their last 4 and clawed their way off the bottom). The point I am trying to make is that although it is natural to get negative about your team after a couple of defeats, the reality of the NRL is that everything can change in a couple of weeks. The Vodafone Warriors magnificent 2nd half defensive effort last week against the Dragons followed up by a professional and solid performance against the Knights has seen them pick up maximum points and put them in the box seat for a top 8 berth.

Of course it is preferable to go into the play-offs with a bit of momentum behind you so we should all hope that the Vodafone Warriors can kick on over the next 3 games and get themselves a higher berth. But should they have a slip-up or two, don't panic. Keep the faith. I guarantee you that no other side will be relishing playing them. There is no side in the NRL that can produce the sort of football the Vodafone Warriors can on their day and that is what makes them not only dangerous, but a joy to watch when they are in full flight.

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If you want to see a set of fans with a real reason to fear for their prospects in September then take a look at myself and my fellow Dragons fans. As happened last season, the wheels have fallen off in dramatic style. A side that looked great prospects to be minor premiers are now struggling to stay afloat. Had they not picked up so many points earlier in the season they would be looking more like favourites to finish bottom of the table. Am I panicking? No (well perhaps slightly) I am confident, or should that be delusional, that we will string a couple of good performances together over the remaining games of the regular season and go into the post-season in rampant form. With luck it could mean we meet the Vodafone Warriors in the Grand Final which would be a dream come true for me.

The reality is that the Vodafone Warriors look in as good a shape as any to take away the big prize so enjoy the ride.

This Warriors Life Top 10: Most Tries In A Season By A Warriors Player By Will Evans


AVID FUSITU'A snapped a five-game try drought on Friday night to keep alive his chances of finishing 2018 as the NRL's top try-scorer and eclipse Francis Meli's club record for most tries in a season.

This week TWL revisits the most prolific tryscoring campaigns by Warriors players.

10=. Solomone Kata – 15 (2016)

After ending Manu Vatuvei's nine-season reign as the Warriors' try king with 12 touchdowns in his 2015 rookie year, centre powerhouse Kata led the club again in his sophomore campaign with 15 tries. Kata got off to a flyer with seven tries in the opening six rounds and came home with a wet sail, crossing five times in his last three games, to finish equal-seventh in the NRL. The Tonga and New Zealand international is second at the club behind David Fusitu'a this year with 10 meat pies.



The mercurial Jones always had a nose for getting over the stripe – racking up 77 tries in 261 first-grade games – but he turned into a genuine try-poacher in 1999. After notching just two doubles in his first 100 appearances for the club, Jones boosted his '99 season tally with a club-record-equalling four-try haul against Western Suburbs in the final round.

7=. David Fusitu'a – 16 (2018)*

'Fus' has crossed 16 times in 19 games this season – fourth in the NRL and just three behind leader Valentine Holmes. But for most of the season the rangy Warriors flyer was winning the competition's tryscoring race, with his hat-trick against Manly giving him 15 tries in just 13 appearances. Injury and a subsequent five-game drought dented Fusitu'a's hopes but a barnstorming four-pointer against Newcastle last Friday has put him back in the frame.

7=. Manu Vatuvei – 16 (2013)

An injury-hampered start to 2013 left 'The Beast' try-less after five rounds but he exploded into action with eight touchdown in his next six outings. A nine-minute hat-trick in the penultimate round against Canberra saw Vatuvei power past Konrad Hurrell (13) as the Warriors' top try-scorer for the ninth straight year.

7=. Manu Vatuvei - 16 (2008)

Despite missing 10 games with injury, Vatuvei finished among the NRL's top 10 try-scorers in a season that saw him make the transition from enigma to world-class winger. His double in the penultimate round against Penrith and a demon-exorcising hat-trick at Parramatta Stadium a week later were critical to the Warriors scraping into the top eight, and he backed up that blistering form with tries in finals wins over Melbourne and Sydney Roosters. Vatuvei was later named as one of the Top Five Players of 2008 in David Middleton's Official Rugby League Annual.











5=. Manu Vatuvei – 17 (2014)

Big Manu played a career-high 23 games in 2014 and cashed in with 17 tries – equal-third in the NRL at the end of the regular season. Following a dry mid-season run, Vatuvei collected another hat-trick at the Raiders' expense in a year that also saw him break into the premiership's top 20 try-scorers of all time. 1

5=. Clinton Toopi – 17 (2003)

Dynamic centre Toopi backed up his breakout 2002 campaign with another stellar year in '03, crossing 17 times in 22 games for the Warriors. The 23-year-old scored 11 tries in his last 10 outings of the NRL season – including a hat-trick against Wests Tigers – and cemented his status as arguably the world's best centre with another treble for the Kiwis against Australia at the end of the year.

4. Clinton Toopi – 18 (2002)

The Taranaki-born game-breaker was the Warriors' top try-scorer during their minor premiership-winning 2002 season, dotting down for 18 tries in 26 appearances. He went on a particularly productive run from Round 4, scoring 13 tries in 13 games for the surging Warriors, but the most indelible memory of Toopi in '02 was his incredible 50-metre solo try in the preliminary final triumph over Cronulla.

3. Sean Hoppe - 19 (1995)

Already regarded as one of the premiership's finest finishers after three seasons at Canberra and Norths, Hoppe lived up to the hype upon his hometown return with the fledgling Auckland Warriors. The Northcote Tigers product bagged six doubles in '95 and finished behind only Manly duo Steve Menzies and John Hopoate in the competition, while he was rewarded for a fabulous season with the Dally M Winger of the Year award.

2. Manu Vatuvei – 20 (2010)

Vatuvei's phenomenal ability to find the try-line peaked in 2010, scoring 20 tries in just 19 games. He picked up blockbusting hat-tricks against Cronulla and Newcastle, while he pieced together a seven-game streak of putting his name on the scoresheet. Shaun Kenny-Dowall and Akuila Uate (both 21 tries) edged him out for the NRL's tryscoring title.

1. Francis Meli – 23 (2003)

The hard-running, enigmatic Meli was among the NRL's front-runners for much of the 2003 season after scoring 13 tries in his first 14 games, but a five-game drought allowed the likes of Rhys Wesser, Nigel Vagana, Matt Sing and Scott Donald to streak ahead. However, a flurry of five tries in the last four rounds put him within reach of Sean Hoppe's club record, which he obliterated with an all-time finals record five tries in the Warriors' mind-blowing 48-22 win over the Bulldogs. He finished the year second behind Wesser (25). Meli's next best return during a seven-year career in the NRL was 11 tries in 25 games in 2001, though he did manage 23 tries is as many outings for St Helens in the 2010 Super League season.

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


The Steel charge continued as the confidence of Selby-Rickit and O'Connell grew and there was just three goals the difference midway through the third quarter.

Mitchell Pearce says Warriors' back three are 'best in the comp'

T'S A term synonymous with the future hall of fame trio in Melbourne, but the Warriors have their own version of a big three in 2018 and fellow NRL heavyweights have taken notice.

Following Friday's 20-4 win over Newcastle, Knights captain Mitchell Pearce hailed the Warriors' back three of Roger Tuivasa-Sheck, Ken Maumalo and David Fusitua as the "best in the comp", after the trio ran amok and filled the stat sheet at Mt Smart Stadium.

Lead by captain Tuivasa-Sheck's mammoth 338-metres gains effort, the outside backs worked in tandem to ensure their side started sets on the front foot, something Pearce said they do better than anyone else.

"I probably rate them the best. Melbourne have got a pretty good back three, the Roosters with Fergo (Blake Ferguson) and guys like that. But with the way Roger's playing at the moment and their two wingers, they're unreal," he said.

"There was times there they were making 30 or 40 metres in three plays just on their own. I was hoping I could try recruit them to our side mid game actually."

Pearce, who ran out for NRL game number 250 on Friday, spent several seasons playing with the Warriors' fullback at the Roosters.

He said he was pleased to have seen Tuivasa-Sheck develop so much this side of the Tasman.

"He's been awesome Roger, obviously I played a bit with him at the Roosters and he was our player of the year there one year. He's a super player and [has] really become a great leader here for the Kiwis.

Knights coach Nathan Brown echoed his captain's sentiment and felt the impact of the Warriors' back three ultimately proved the difference on Friday.

"We didn't handle their back three as good as we'd have liked. Roger (Tuisava-Sheck) had a bit of a day out and the two big wingers are big, powerful men," Brown said.

"Back threes play such a big part in our contests today and Roger is up there as good as any and the two wingers, they're big, big men, so they've got a good nucleus there to really build some momentum if they have their best players in the field."

Combined, the three metre-eaters ran for more than 650m total.

Warriors coach Stephen Kearney revealed post match that he set a challenge for his back three to step up of late, after some lacklustre physical displays mid year.

"In games like these in the past, we've let ourselves down in terms of our physicality, when we haven't aimed up," he said.

"That starts when you carry the footy and Ken (Maumalo), Roger (Tuivasa-Sheck) and David (Fusitua), actually all of the back five, they set the tone for us in attack in terms of their physicality and the way they carried the footy.

"But I thought Roger's effort followed on from last week, in terms of his performance."
