## Same starting side, Beale on bench

#### VODAFONE WARRIORS v CANBERRA RAIDERS 8.00pm, Friday, August 31, 2018 Mount Smart Stadium, Auckland

**ILESTONE MAN** Simon Mannering will be centre stage in an unchanged starting line-up for his historic 300th NRL appearance when the Vodafone Warriors face Canberra in their final regular season match at Mount Smart Stadium on Friday (8.00pm kick-off).

In his 14th and final first-grade campaign, one-club Mannering – who turned 32 today – will become the first player to appear in 300 matches for the club, just the 34th to reach the mark in the competition's 100-year history and only the 16th to do so for a single club.

He'll again be at loose forward with Tohu Harris confirmed to start in the second row after initially being listed on the bench for his comeback appearance in last Friday night's impressive 36-16 win over Penrith.

The backline includes Mason Lino in the halves with Blake Green again omitted as he recovers from a calf injury picked up in the one-point loss to the Bulldogs on August 19.

The only change comes on the bench where Gerard Beale is named in the 17. He was originally listed in the centres when the side was selected for the Penrith encounter but was subsequently ruled out with a hamstring complaint.

Mannering's achievement has become the natural focus as the Vodafone Warriors strive to improve their position in their last match before experiencing finals football for the first time since 2011.

After making his debut as an 18-year-old on June 26, 2005, Mannering is set to join Ruben Wiki (312 games) as the only other New Zealander to reach the mark.

Of the 33 players on the list ahead of him, he has played against or with 25 of them, the three he has had as team-mates being Wiki, Steve Price and Ryan Hoffman.

Mannering and Shaun Johnson are the only players in the 2018 side who have had previous finals experience with the Vodafone Warriors, Mannering being part of play-offs campaigns in 2007, 2008, 2010 and 2011.

The Vodafone Warriors go into Friday night's match still in eighth place but one of four teams on 30 points on a table which shows just four points between the eight sides and only two points covering second to eighth.

The Stephen Kearney-coached side has the chance to take its tally of wins this season to 15 with victory over the Raiders. That would equal the club's second-best regular season total achieved in 2003 behind the record 17 in the minor premiership-winning campaign in 2002.

For just the second time in their history – 2002 was the first – the Vodafone Warriors have gone through an entire season sitting inside the top eight every week.

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Wing David Fusitu'a is within reach of creating more history as the first Vodafone Warrior to top the try-scoring list for the regular season. His hat-trick against Penrith lifted him to 21 tries with Cronulla's Valentine Holmes second on 20. Manu Vatuvei (20 tries in 2010) is the only other Vodafone Warriors player to reach the 20-try mark in a regular season (Francis Meli had 23 tries in 2003 but five came in one finals match against the Bulldogs).

While the Raiders have missed the finals, they come into Friday's match on the back of a potent performance in their 24-12 win over South Sydney.

The Vodafone Warriors have won 18 of 39 matches against Canberra since the two teams first met in 1995 while they have an 11-8 edge in home encounters.

## Ye-hah, at bloody last

ADE IT, after 11 agonising years we are playing finals footy. It was so long ago that last time we made it I could get it up without the help of a little blue triangle. I was worried I would go to my grave without ever seeing finals footy again. But here we are.

Anything else from here is an absolute bonus.

It is tempting to be smug and remind all the doubters that before a ball was even kicked we were highly-fancied to collect the wooden spoon.

Immortal Andrew Johns was among them, pretty-much every Aussie journalist, quite a few Kiwi ones, and more than a handful of long –suffering Warriors fans were convinced we were in for another year of misery.

What has been achieved is quite remarkable. And yes, I know that making the eight i a competition of 16 isn't perhaps the greatest yardstick, but credit where it is due, the boys done good!

I will give you 10 reasons for the turnaround.

David Fusitu'a. If you have a 20-try a year man, you are going to win more often than you lose. His form has been incredible. The best winger in the comp behind Addo-Carr, as voted by NRL players.

Issac Luke. This is the first year that he has played like the hooker we thought we were buying. Give him another contract and hope he does it again.

Agnatius Paasi. Plenty rolled their eyes when we recruited him. They aren't now though. He has given us some up-front grunt and his work rate has been exceptional.

Stephen Kearney. There were more doubters than backers but he stuck to his guns, laid a platform, listened to advice, and instilled belief.

Blake Green. Blake who? Described as an underwhelming signing, he added calm when needed, and has been an excellent addition. Any more like him you don't want Manly, send them our way.

Alex Corvo: Over-weight, over-fed, and over here. Not since the trainer arrived from the Storm though. We looked like we ready to play from day one, and few sides have gassed us.

Brian Smith. Our general manager of football keeps to himself but has a long history of rebuilding clubs. I'm guessing, but I have a sneaking suspicion his coaching experience has been called on by Kearney, and that's just smart.

Mason Lino. Take a bow young man. When called upon he was exceptional. Once when we had a half out injured and it was just a matter of how badly we would be beaten, Lino put a stop to that.

Tohu Harris, Roger Tuivasa-Sheck, Adam Blair. All have had their highs and lows but teams follow leaders, and we had three outstanding ones.

Jazz Tevaga. Played well from the off, and got better. Teams didn't seem to know what to do with him and he cashed in, scoring tries and setting up others. A revelation.

Every one of those 10 reasons is an individual, which is fair enough, but in truth if you want some more reasons, how about the fact that we played like a team. So many players came in when needed like Lino, and did not let us down.

The defensive efforts we showed game after game were remarkable. We at last have a defence after years of trying to win without one.

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Depth is worth a plug too. Bunty Afoa, Isaiah Papali'i, James Gavet, Ken Maumalo, Leivaha Pulu...all good value. Depth equals competition for places.

Better chuck in coming out of the blocks like scalded cats. The Dragons did too, and it's no surprise both sides made it to the eight.

Last year I disagreed with one journalist who argued we had to learn to win away from home, saying I didn't care, just win at home first. Turns out he was right.

Can we mount a run, who knows? But anyone who isn't happy – bar the odd hiccup - with what we have been served up must be very hard to please indeed.

#### 300 For One Of The Best

Writing this ahead of team-naming Tuesday, one assumes Simon Mannering will appear against the Raiders on Friday night in what will be his 300th NRL game.

That is an incredible achievement, and an even greater one to have clocked up the milestone as a one-club man.

He has been the ultimate professional, and I have said so many times, so it came as no surprise that with his milestone looming, he basically said he didn't care, and that the focus had to be on the side making the most of the opportunity of reaching the finals series.

Bring a mate, because if there is one guy who deserves to play his last home game in front a packed house, it is Mannering.

He and Shaun Johnson are the only players still around who were there when we made the grand final in 2011.

"I'm just happy for the young guys who will experience something that's pretty special in footy and it's been a long time coming for the club, so it's going to be cool to be a part of it again. It's just a different level and the more you can have that experience, you grow in confidence in your ability."

The younger players in the side would do well to heed the 31-year-old. He has given his all and been a rock solid player for us for years, and there can be no doubt he knows his stuff.

"It's an opportunity. We can't just be happy with scraping in and seeing what happens. Let's really give it a good nudge."

I am told management is working hard to ensure the five-time Player of the Year receives a hero's farewell.

After all he has given us, give him your Friday night and pack the park to send him off with an experience he will never forget.

#### Johnson On A high

Last year at around this time halfback Shaun Johnson was the talk of the town after muttering something along the lines of, "you got what you wanted", when we were awful and consigned to an early exit from the comp.

I mention this because it had never seemed to me he was the type of bloke to lack confidence.

But that remark was all the evidence you needed that the constant criticism of his own play, and the team, had sent his confidence spiralling- hardly surprising since he had also had to deal with terrible injuries.

So I was delighted to read after the Panthers win that Johnson says his confidence is sky high.

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I don't know enough about the game truth be known to know if it is true that he is a "confidence player", which I hear all the time.

But if he is, bring it on, because he was excellent on Friday, and if that means we can expect even more, so be it.

He is certainly in great form. On Friday he managed the game superbly.

"I am getting there," Johnson said. "I just keep working. There are always things you can work on."

It must be tough being the big name, and carrying that responsibility, which is where I think having players like Blair, Harris and RTS around him must have helped.

The expectation he can carry the side probably hasn't diminished, but at least he has others in the side that help.

#### And This Is Class Too

If you want more evidence Johnson is in a different place this year, consider what he had to say after the Panthers.

He saluted Mason Lino, who was filling in for the injured Blake Green, saying the boys love playing with him.

He's hardly going to say, he's a numpty and I don't know why they pick him, but Johnson was not holding back on the praise.

"You can't replace someone like that, someone who is selfless."

Before the game, Lino admitted to feeling the pressure. It didn't show.

Green is likely to be back soon but, says Lino: "I'm not looking too far ahead. But hopefully we get another crack soon. With Greeny out it's big shoes to fill. I'm fortunate to have a good support crew. There's a wealth of experience there so that made my job a lot easier."

Lino lost his first nine NRL games across three years, but has now played a hand in four important wins this season. Seems fair to give Shaun the last word

"Mase had a rough start to his NRL career s. To see him winning games is very pleasing."

#### And All That Jazz

Three NRL clubs are chasing Jazz Tevaga, who has rejected our offer to test the market.

Negotiations are continuing, thankfully, but apparently three clubs have expressed interest.

"I would love to stay but if things don't work out I might have to make the move," Jazz said.

And we would love you to stay mate!

## Struggle

**THE RECENT** New Zealand-England Test in Denver on 24 June created plenty of headlines before it was played and it is still in the news more than two months later. Firstly there was criticism that players would be affected by the long flights to and from the venue and then there were problems at the game when the singer struggled with the anthems of both countries. If the reports are true, the New Zealand Rugby League are still to receive the promised fee from the match promotor. I am a firm supporter of international Rugby League and with this Test being played in the USA, I was interested in the standing of our game at grass roots level in America. The current chairman of the USA Rugby League is an Australian, Peter Illfield, who played 11 seasons in the Newcastle competition with the Maitland Pumpkin Pickers. After retiring, he worked in development roles with the Newcastle Knights, the Western Australian and Northern Territory Rugby Leagues. He then moved to the USA but has recently returned to Australia, so perhaps the USA League will appoint a new chairman in the near future.

Rugby League struggles in the USA. There are only around 500 players compared to 400,000 rugby union numbers. Despite the large number of players, the USA Rugby Union team has only won three of 25 games at seven World Cups. The USA Sevens Rugby Union team has improved over the past few years and finished sixth on the last world sevens circuit. American Rugby League is centred north and south of New York, as well as Florida and Georgia. The competition is played from late May until the end of August and the 2018 season was made up of 11 teams in two conferences. The seven teams in the Northern Conference were Brooklyn Kings, Philadelphia Fight, White Plains Wombats, New York Knights, Boston 13s, Delaware Black Foxes and the Northern Virginia Eagles. The Brooklyn Kings were undefeated in their six matches against the other teams, scoring 288 points to 100. They then won the Northern Conference Championship game on 11 August at their home ground, Bushwick Inlet Park at Brooklyn. Brooklym Kings 34 (Jerome Easthope 3, Brandon Anderson 2, Seimou Smith tries; Reece Purcell 5 goals) beat White Plains Wombats 18. Hooker Jerome Easthope had a strong all round game for the Kings. The Brooklyn coach is Brent Richardson, who is the son of South Sydney general manager of football, Shane Richardson. Brent is working for Google in New York.

Down south, there are four teams in the Southern Conference. These sides are Jacksonville Axemen, Atlanta Rhinos, Tampa Mayhem and the South West Florida Copperheads. In the Southern Conference Championship game at Jacksonville on 11 August, Jacksonville 44 (Lachlan Bristow 3, Tyler McClain, Kevin Wathen, Jed Pearce, David Washington, Desta Bailey tries; Lacklan Bristow 6 goals) beat Atlanta 16. Hooker, Lachlan Bristow, finished with 24 points from his three tries and six goals. The Jacksonville coach is another Australian, Sean Rutgerson, who first coached the club in 2009 and then returned in 2016 and has coached for the past three seasons. He played 12 first grade games in 1998/99 with the North Sydney Bears and then 56 first grade matches in four seasons with the Canberra Raiders from 2000. He also played 74 games in three seasons with English club Salford. Rutgerson, aged 40 has just been appointed as Head Coach of the USA National team, with Richardson his assistant.

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While USA Rugby League is centred in the 11 teams in the two conferences, there is some interest in the game in Chicago, Los Angeles and Texas. On 11 August in Chicago, an exhibition game was played between the Chicago Stockyarders and an Ontario Provincial side from Canada. This game was organised by the Midwest Rugby League and won 24-12 by the Canadians. The Midwest Rugby League is aiming to join the USA National competition in 2020 and both the Stockyarders and Ontario will probably be the teams from this league. The week before the exhibition game, a Cleveland team beat Chicago in a Nines Rugby League game. Cleveland is a possibility of joining the Midwest League in the 2020 USA National League.

The 2018 USA Rugby League Championship game was played in Jacksonville at the University of North Florida Rugby Field under lights at 7pm on Saturday 25 August. The Brooklyn Kings had to find more than US \$6,000 to fund their trip from New York to Jacksonville.

Matt Bailey, who was born at Wollongong, 85 kms south of Sydney, is the founder of the Brooklyn Kings. In his late 20s, Matt, who has a Bachelor of Management in Sport and Exercise from Sydney's University of Technology, went to New York in 2013 on a whim with no job lined up. But he soon established himself in the tough job market of American Sport. He began working with the Brooklyn Sports and Entertainment body and founded the Kings in 2014. The club played its first competition game in late May that year. With hard work and plenty of drive, the Kings have several sponsors, including the Kent Ale House, Professional Physical Therapy, Nutrition Station, Pro Plaster, CrossFit Outbreak and the Nicole Fitzsimons Foundation. The Brooklyn Royals Dance team is the Kings cheersquad. None of the players are paid and around 80 percent of them are American born, as each club is only allowed to have three imports.

In the USA championship game, the Jacksonville Axemen, who were formed in 2006, were too good, winning 58-16. But the Kings never stopped trying and scored two excellent second half tries. They will benefit from the experience and are set to again be one of the leading USA club teams in 2019. This was the Axemen's third title. Hooker Lachlan Bristow finished with five tries and nine goals for a total of 38 points. In the South Conference Championship game against Atlanta two weeks before, he scored 24 points. Jacksonville 58 (Lachlan Bristow 5, Tyler McClain 2, Will Fletcher, David Washington, Kyle Grinold tries; Lachlan Bristow 9 goals) beat Brooklyn 16.

What about the English Challenge Cup Final. Congratulations to the Catalans Dragons who beat the Warrington Wolves at Wembley Stadium on Saturday. Catalans 20 (Lewis Tierney, Ben Garcia, Brayden Williams tries; Josh Drinkwater 4 goals) beat Warrington 14 (Ben Murdoch-Masila, George King tries; Tyrone Roberts 3 goals). Crowd 50,672. The Challenge Cup was first played in 1896 and except for some war years, has been played every year since the first one. This was the 117th Challenge Cup and the lowest crowd since 1945. But with a French team involved and the costs for its supporters to come from the south of France to London, a below average crowd was expected. In its long history, the Cup has never left England and the win by the Catalans, will provide a real boost to French Rugby League.

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Founded in 2000, the Catalans club is located at Perpignan, which is just 13 kms west of the Mediterranean and close to the Spanish border. Queensland State of Origin coach, Kevin Walters, was in charge of the Catalans for 57 matches in 2009 and 2010, while the Roosters head coach, Trent Robinson, was the club's head coach for 63 games in 2011 and 2012. Saturday's match was the Catalans second Challenge Cup final after they were well beaten by St. Helens in 2007.

Finally it was great to see the Warriors stand up on Friday night when it really mattered. The whole team was great all around the park and many in the Australian media are saying the New Zealanders will be a definite threat come semi final time. The Warriors' final game of the regular season, against the in-form Canberra Raiders, who have beaten the highly rated Roosters and South Sydney in their last two games, will not be easy. Congratulations to young Shark, Kyle Flanagan, 19, who made his first grade debut on Sunday in the Sharks good 38-12 win over the Knights. It is the first time, since John Lang coached his son Martin at Penrith in 2004, that a son has played with his father as coach, in the NRL.

**THERE HAS** probably never been a more inspiring rugby league rags-to-riches story than that of Jonathan Thurston, the spindly, ill-disciplined kid who no club wanted when he first came on the market before rising to claim four Dally M medals as the NRL's outstanding player and three Golden Boot awards as the world's best player. After over 400 club and representative games, he has just one game left before hanging up his headgear.

It is impossible to count the times I have cursed Thurston for his brilliance when inspiring the Cowboys against the Warriors or Australia against New Zealand, or the frequency that I have cheered him on for the Cowboys against other clubs – most notably in the 2015 Grand Final triumph over the Broncos – or for Queensland against NSW. Then, of course, there was the matter of his not choosing to pursue a career with the Kiwis.

Born in Brisbane of a Gunggari mother and a New Zealand-born father, Thurston showed promise as a young footballer in Toowoomba but was spurned by NRL scouts because of his slight physique. A number of clubs would not even sign him for free. Manager Sam Ayoub finally negotiated a deal with the Bulldogs, whose Belmore base was chose to where he lived, after promising Thurston's mother he would keep an eye on him.

If that 2001 contract – with the playing fee listed as "nil" -- is still in existence it should be in the NRL Museum. Thurston's path to first grade was blocked by established halves Brett Sherwin and Braith Anasta but he made his debut in 2002 and two years later was signed by the Cowboys. Former Bulldogs board member John Brown has disclosed they could have kept him for as little as \$150,000. Instead, they retained Sherwin.

Thurston was perhaps then struggling to make his way on and off the field. But the Bulldogs made the 2004 Grand Final and he joined the interchange when an injury sidelined skipper Steve Price. It is history now that Thurston selflessly gave his winner's ring to Price. Clearly, there was something more to this kid. The club arranged for a replacement ring but his action was just the first example of his ongoing maturity and generosity.

Returning to Queensland and running his own team transformed Thurston into a super footballer. So much so that the often maligned Cowboys reached the 2005 Grand Final, only to be beaten by Wests Tigers and another brilliant youngster in Benji Marshall. It would take Thurston ten more years to carry the NRL premiership trophy back to Townsville, and by then he was being feted as one of the finest players of any era.

Queensland honours and his first Dally M Medal had followed his Cowboys debut and in 2006 he was called into the Kangaroos squad. The Kiwis were defending their Tri-Nations title in the final at Sydney with the teams locked at 12-12 after 80 minutes. For the first time a Test match entered golden point. Thurston pounced against a hesitant Kiwis defender, broke clear and set up Darren Lockyer for the try and a 16-12 victory.

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There were a few setbacks among Thurston's glittering career statistics. Queensland actually lost two (of the 13) Origin series in which he played, and his 39 Tests included losses to the Kiwis in the 2008 World Cup final and the 2015 Anzac Test, plus a draw in 2009. But his briefly triumphant opponents knew he would come back even stronger. In the 2013 World Cup he was Man of the Match in all four of his appearances.

I'm going to miss Jonathan Thurston weaving his magic on my television screen. I learned to understand his love and loyalty to his mother's Indigenous heritage rather than his father's Kiwi lineage. Not only was Thurston a brilliant attacker, a great tactician, an inspiring captain and a courageous defender but also a magnificent goal and field-goal kicker. He has scored 99 tries for his club and rep teams and laid on hundreds more.

Nor will I be alone. His team-mates, especially "wing man" Gavin Cooper, will also miss the man Kevin Walters calls "little Johnny". Thurston was first to respectfully hand his kicking tees back to his ball boys, while a generation of young fans have been shocked and ecstatic when the great man has walked over and handed them his distinctive head gear. "JT" might have arrived as a scrawny kid but he leaves as a giant of our game.

## Catalans Show Warriors The Way

**THE CHALLENGE** Cup has left England for the first time in its 122-year history following the Catalans Dragons' exhilarating 20-14 triumph over warmly-favoured Warrington Wolves in last weekend's final at Wembley Stadium. Accompanying it on the plane to Perpignan was the Lance Todd Trophy after fullback Tony Gigot became the first Frenchman to be named Man of the Match since the trophy's inception in 1946.

If the Warriors need inspiration on the eve of the NRL play-offs then they can look towards the south of France. Catalans was on the verge of relegation from Super League this time last year, having to win an all-ornothing match to retain its status. Under the coaching of former England head coach and Warriors assistant Steve McNamara they regained credibility and even eliminated mighty St Helens in their semi-final.

But they were underdogs again in the final. Warrington is one of England's most formidable outfits and Catalans was not expected to do any better than in its previous losing Cup final in 2007, when it was captained by Stacey Jones. But this Catalans side led 14-6 at half-time, 20-6 soon afterwards and displayed great resilience as Warrington applied the pressure with a series of last-quarter goal-line assaults as the tension rose.

McNamara's team was a united nations captained by prop Remi Casty, who played 12 times for the Sydney Roosters in 2014. His other 263 club games have been for Catalans. Various team-mates have allegiance to New Zealand (former Kiwis prop Sam Moa and Levin-born Kenny Edwards), Fiji (Brayden Wiliame), PNG (David Mead), England (Michael McIlorum), Tonga (Samisoni Langi), Scotland (Lewis Tierney), Australia (Josh Drinkwater) and France.

Immediately after fulltime, Gigot, Casty and McNamara spoke of the boost it would give a beleaguered sport in France, where it struggles for survival. Millions of euros are poured into rugby union while rugby league has little government or media support. "This will show everyone we can play rugby league in France," said Gigot, whose Man of the Match trophy is a memorial to 1907-08 All Gold Lance Todd.

Catalans emphasized it had not gone to Wembley just to make up the numbers when wing Lewis Tierney scored in the second minute. His proud parents travelled Down Under for the 2017 World Cup and were befriended by Sir Peter Leitch on the day Scotland suffered a massive defeat by the Kiwis in Christchurch. Tierney later moved from Wigan to the Dragons and his folks will be mighty proud of the role he played at Wembley.

Sam Moa completed a rare international double. After making his name with Hull in the Super League he spent four seasons at the Sydney Roosters, where he played in their 2013 Grand Final victory. His typically dogged display in the front-row did much to subdue the big Warrington pack. Kenny Edwards, a sometimes controversial character when at Parramatta, joined in enthusiastically from the interchange.

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There was a price to pay for having an overseas finalist and for the absence of powerhouses Wigan, St Helens and Leeds, who invariably bring armies of fans when they make Cup finals. The attendance of 50,612 was the lowest since 1945. But hearing the La Marseillaise being played while one of Britain's most venerable trophies was presented would have warmed the hearts of rugby league romantics throughout the world.

## **Linwood Keas Complete Hatrick**

**NOTHER TRIUMPH** for the Linwood Keas. Heartbreak for the Hornby Panthers. They were the contrasting stories from Sunday's dramatic Canterbury grand final in the last club match to be played at the Addington field we leaguies still call the Show Grounds or Rugby League Park. The Keas flew home with two converted tries in the last five minutes to win 20-16 and carry off the Pat Smith Challenge Trophy.

Linwood became the first club to win three consecutive grand finals – all of them at Hornby's expense – since Eastern Suburbs completed its treble in 1981. No one in the Keas camp, not even coach Andrew Auimatagi, was born then, though Hornby's two 38-year-old stalwarts, Corey Lawrie and Jonny Limmer, were probably eyeing up any oval shaped balls left lying around their romper rooms.

This was a showdown worthy of the last grand final before the Canterbury Rugby League moves its operations to the new Nga Puna Wai sports complex in 2019. The teams lived up to their pre-match billing. Linwood was unbeaten this season and is the last of the four original 1913 clubs still playing premier grade football; Hornby remains the most prolific championship winning club in the code's history.

The victory completed a come-from-behind double for the Keas. Their women's team was also playing in a third consecutive grand final, though they had lost in 2016 and 2017 to the Papanui Tigers. It seemed that sequence would continue, too, when the Tigers led 33-26 into the final quarter. But the Linwood women were to show the way for their male counterparts by scoring two more tries and winning 38-33.

Though dominating territory during the opening quarter of the men's grand final and forcing Hornby into three goal-line drop-outs, Linwood had no points to show for its hard work. Then the momentum began to change. Hornby gradually turned the arm wrestle in its favour to score a try after 30 minutes through fullback Pesini Tavake which, with James Baxendale's conversion, made the scoreline 6-0 at halftime.

In contrast to the points drought which had preceded it, the first seven minutes of the second spell were downright crazy. Firstly, Linwood scored a Daniel Hartley try for 6-4. But Hornby quickly struck back twice through tries to second-rower Lawrie, who really is an ageing but still much respected Warrior, and wing Charlie Charlie. After 47 minutes it was 16-4 and Hornby had its 28th title in sight.

It stayed that way for most of the second spell and one had to admire Hornby's commitment on defence. For 68 minutes it stayed firm, having conceded only a sole try from a dummy half flop-over and resisted everything else. But then Linwood stand-off Toi Sepuloni darted through a narrow gap to score and the mood changed among the large and boisterous crowd assembled to farewell the Show Grounds.

Representative centre Erwin Sauni brought Linwood within range at 16-14 with his try and Hartley's conversion. Referee Gary Smallridge crucially judged Hornby to be off-side from the kick-off and Linwood attacked again. The Panthers were all but out on their feet when Canterbury prop Alex Todd – later named Man of the Match – crashed over for the 78th minute try which, converted by Hartley, completed the scoring.

As Baxendale, the Hornby captain, said later, it was a devastating feeling to lead for so long and so late in the game before having the trophy snatched away from his players. But, like all Hornby teams since the club was formed in 1915 and entered senior football two years later, he pledged they would be back with a vengeance next season – and there is every reason to believe Lawrie and Limmer will be among them.

Coach Auimatagi and his Linwood squad have other milestones to pursue. Not since Papanui between 1971 and 1974 has a club won four consecutive grand finals. The record for the most championships in a row is held by Sydenham, which won the first six under the old round-robin system from 1913 until 1919 (there was no senior football in 1916 because of the First World War). Sydenham is no longer in the top grade.



**GET IN!!!!!** With their convincing 36-16 over the Penrith Panthers on Friday night the Vodafone Warriors sealed their play-off place for the first time in 7 years. As I told you last week I had no doubt they would do it. Their loss to the Bulldogs was not as bad as some may have felt. Look at the demolition job they did on the Dragons, making it 4 wins in their last 5 games. The Dragons defeat moved the Vodafone Warriors even closer to them on points differential and there is a glimmer of hope that they can still make the top 4.

Here is what is needed. Obviously they need to despatch the Canberra Raiders in their last round-robin game. I for one have no doubt they will achieve that. The hapless Dragons are likely to lose at the Newcastle Knights which takes them out of the equation. The Panthers have to travel to table-topping Melbourne Storm and are surely going to come away with nothing from that trip. The Broncos are taking on the Manly Sea Eagles and although they are favourites to win that one they currently have just a points differential advantage of just 3 over the Vodafone Warriors. So if they get a slightly bigger winning margin than the Broncos this weekend that will also move them above the Brisbane outfit.

That just leaves the Cronulla Sharks standing between the Vodafone Warriors and the top 4. They travel to the in-form Bulldogs and are in no way guaranteed a win. The only downside is the 63 point advantage the Sharks have over the Vodafone Warriors at present. That could be a bridge too far but with Mt Smart likely to be full and pumping there is no saying what the lads can achieve.

Having crunched all the numbers I can see the Vodafone Warriors finishing 5th after the last round of games, missing out on the top 4 to the Sharks. I am however confident that they can go quite far in the play-offs. Could they win it? Of course they could. Will they? Ask me in another month.

NB: There is a good chance that my play-off calculations could be wrong. My abacus is missing some beads.

#### Beauden Barrett You Beauty

If there was any doubt left over who was the right man to wear the All Black No. 10 jersey then surely that was dispelled on Saturday night. Beauden Barrett's performance was up there with the all-time greats in the history of rugby union. Comparisons with Dan Carter at his best are in my mind premature but there is nothing wrong with living in the moment and enjoying the magic that Barrett is giving us. We should also celebrate the fact that there is such talented depth at the first-five position in New Zealand. Richie Mo'unga and Damian Mckenzie would stroll into most other international sides and would certainly not let the All Blacks down should they be called upon.

A few years ago I was fascinated to learn that Barrett went to the same school as Conrad Smith. I persuaded Sky to let me go down to Francis Douglas Memorial College (aka Fung Dung) to film a story and find out a bit more about an establishment that produced two such stellar rugby players.

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A quick look in the school chapel gives you no doubt about the importance of rugby. Amongst the stained glass windows there is one with a Brother holding a rugby ball.

Their results showed how much their rugby programme had improved over recent years. Their annual fixture against New Plymouth Boys, started in 1996, had been dominated by NPBHS but recent times have seen that gap between the two colleges close with FDMC winning several encounters and being close in others.

One of the things that obviously helps build players of character is the discipline and respect instilled in most Catholic Schools and Fung Dung is no exception. Barrett was sent to the school as were his brothers and al-though the family lived not far from the college they were sent as boarders. Having been at a boarding school myself I can attest that this also builds character and gives one a sense of brotherhood and team ethic.

At school Barrett was so good at most things that he was given the nickname "God" which he apparently wasn't fond of. For me that shows the humility of the guy (I would have quite happily accepted that nickname had it been given to me. Unfortunately I only got nicknames that aren't printable in a family publication like this one). Another example of his humble nature is that he told me a few years ago that his younger brother would turn out to be the best rugby player of the lot. He wasn't lying about his little brother's talent but although Jordie is a top player I think he has a fair way to go yet before he tops big bro.

Rather than compare talents let us give thanks to Fung Dung for helping mould such All Black talent as Conrad Smith and Scott, Beauden and Jordie Barrett (and brother Kane who also played Super Rugby, All Black hooker Liam Coltman, Hurricanes hooker Ricky Riccitelli and former All Black coach and player John Mitchell). But we must also blame them for Patrick Gower of Newshub and NZ Herald fame. I was told that he was a bit of a handful at school and remains so till this day. Oh well there always has to be one I suppose (just joking Paddy).



"We knew he was going to be tough to contain and we tried to get numbers in on him a little bit more this time around and luckily it worked out."

With improved defence came some electric attack as the Warriors' right edge ignited, resulting in a David Fusitu'a hat-trick.

Hiku, playing back in his preferred position of right centre after two weeks coming off the interchange bench, said the showdown against Penrith was one he had his eye on since their round 17 encounter, and was "more or less" pleased with his individual performance.

"I was a little bit nervous. That last time we played them was probably the worst game I've played, we got slaughtered on our edge and I think that was playing on my mind a little bit coming into the game if I'm being honest," he said.

"I tried to just push it aside and the boys did a good job. Having all those special type of players around you, it just makes my attacking game come so much easier.

"Shauny is a natural runner, Tohu (Harris) is a skillful player and Fus I mean, he can do anything that guy. To get the win and do it with this club was more important to me and yeah, very pleased."

Coach Stephen Kearney was pleased with his side's overall performance, and that of his right centre.

"After his last performance against them (Penrith) he was preparing for them to come down his way, but Peta is quality," Kearney said.

#### Roger Tuivasa-Sheck's drive to succeed is helping propel his Warriors to finals glory. By **MICHAEL BURGESS**

T the age of 10, Roger Tuivasa-Sheck learned an important life lesson. His father would always take him to footy training well before the scheduled start, but unlike the other early arrivals, young Roger was tasked with completing various physical drills.

"The others were joking around, playing touch [rugby] in their school uniforms, but I was there, ready to go, training and doing my own thing with Dad," Tuivasa-Sheck tells *Big League*. "I used to get a bit annoyed, thinking, 'I just want to go and play touch.'


"At the time I didn't really know, but I just followed what Dad said. A few years later, it all clicked; he got me quicker and sharper and drilled into me everything about discipline. It's something I've never forgotten."

That appetite for hard work, and drive to succeed, has defined his career, and right now Tuivasa-Sheck is in a good place.

He's the local boy leading the Warriors in their most impressive campaign in years, and he's enjoying it. He's also a new father, with fiancée Ashley Walker giving birth to their daughter Amara three months ago.

#### WARRIORS REVIVA

It's a massive turnaround from last year. The Warriors' campaign had spiralled out of control after a promising start, and their new skipper



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carried much of the burden. The team won just seven matches and dropped their last nine games, leaving Tuivasa-Sheck at the crossroads.

"It was very tough, that period," he reflects. "I was coming up to my last year and working out what I wanted to do. At the time there was a lot of talk about rugby union coming into the picture... and for me it was true.

"After the Warriors' season, I put all my eggs into the Kiwis' basket. I hoped a good World Cup would get me going, get the enjoyment back." The depleted Kiwis made a reasonable

start to the tournament, with wins over Samoa and Scotland.

"The first two rounds were good," he recalls. "But in the Tonga game, then the Fiji game, once again the pressure got to the team and we fell away. Again I was very disappointed, and after the way we'd finished up with the Warriors – nine and zero – I was pretty down."

#### **CHANGING GEARS**

Tuivasa-Sheck had made a huge call to leave the Roosters in 2015, but was sold on the idea of creating a legacy for league in New Zealand. Now he had to make an even bigger decision, one that would encompass the prime years of his career.

"I wanted to play on the big stage," he explains. "To compete against the best, because that's what excites me – the challenge of the big games. Over the years, we weren't putting ourselves in the position to go for that top spot, to play against the best.

"That's the only reason I started to look outside, and at rugby. I had seen the [British] Lions tour (versus the All Blacks) and I thought, 'These are the type of games that I want to be playing in."

Despite interest from New Zealand Rugby and several other NRL clubs, Tuivasa-Sheck

felt loyalty to the Warriors, but had to be convinced that things were going to be different.

During the off-season, coach Stephen Kearney kept him updated on signings and new CEO Cameron George outlined his vision for the club.

"It all sounded great," he says. "But it was time to see some action, some follow-up."

That began when Tuivasa-Sheck returned to pre-season training in January.

"Alex Corvo was smashing the boys," he says "It felt so professional when I came back into the environment. The boys were like, 'No, you can't stand around, you have to get on the move, run to your next station. There is no resting bro."

Further evidence came during the subsequent fitness tests.

"In the last pre-season, I was always up the front in our running testing," he says. "Now I was in the middle of the group, fighting to cross the line. I thought, 'Wow, these boys have been putting in the work.""

Another crucial step came during the team's pre-season camp in Mount Maunganui.

one

"We had a lot of stuff going on, a few honest discussions," he says. "That was when I thought, 'OK, these boys are finally starting to open up.' I could see that everyone had had enough of not making the finals. That was another moment where I figured these guys were serious."

where I figured these guys were serious." Tuivasa-Sheck agreed a new four year deal in late February – "My gut feeling told me there was something special happening here," he says – yet he remained edgy. "It all felt different," says Tuivasa-Sheck.

"It all felt different," says Tuivasa-Sheck. "But you never really know until you play." The emphatic 32-20 win over the Rabbitohs

in Perth in Round 1 provided the answer.

"That was special," he says. "Especially because of what we'd been through [in 2017]. To sit in the changing room singing our team song was great – though a few of us had probably forgotten the words, it had been that long."

#### **ALL CLASS**

In time, Tuivasa-Sheck's decision to recommit could go down as a landmark moment for the Warriors. Like the discovery of a 15-year-old jet-heeled Stacey Jones running around for the Point Chevalier Pirates in the early 1990s, Simon Mannering's switch to the 13-a-side code in his final year at Nelson College, or the recruitment coup of Steve Price and Ruben Wiki in 2004.

"Roger is developing into a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for a club," Warriors boss George adds. "He's a great leader, a great player and a great human." Tuivasa-Sheck has averaged 175 running

Tuivasa-Sheck has averaged 175 running metres this year, adding 13 line breaks, nine try assists and three tries. The improvement in his defence has also caught the eye, with a series of remarkable try-line stops.

"That sums up Roger, and his desire to be the best," Warriors assistant coach Andrew McFadden tells *Big League*. "Some people say that, but he really lives it. When he first got here, his defensive game was pretty average. He took that feedback on - tough feedback – and said, 'OK, I'm going to sort this out.' And he's been one of the best defensive fullbacks this year." More than anything, it's the 25-year-old's constant drive to succeed, engendered on the

More than anything, it's the 25-year-old's constant drive to succeed, engendered on the dusty fields of South Auckland, that stands out.



"There is a truckload of improvement left in him," says Warriors football manager Brian Smith, who gave Tuivasa-Sheck his NRL debut in 2012. "In the fullback position now there are multiple areas you can make a difference. Roger has worked that out and there's a drive, a compulsion that he has got, to find more and more, for himself, his team-mates and his club. He is living proof to everyone: if you work hard, you improve."

Even in the disappointing 26-27 loss to the Bulldogs last week, as some team-mates faltered, Tuivasa-Sheck delivered his usual relentless effort. He doesn't know any other way, as he hunts September football for a restless nation.

"We want to take this team to a place it hasn't been before," he says. "That's a big challenge, but one that I want to take on. That's all that matters fight now."
