There were a number of apologies from former players around the world who could not be there, and I thought the best was from Fred Ah Kuoi. These days he is the United States, but he sent us a great video message. It contained a joke at his former teammate Dane O'Hara's expense, about how Dane was going to shout all the Kiwis a round.

I have never seen a bloke turn so white so quickly.

New Zealand Rugby league boss Scott Carter was very good in his presentation about the vision of the NZRL too.

The whole exercise was about two things, firstly raising the profile of League for Life, and secondly, about getting together as many former Kiwis as we possibly could.

We certainly managed that, getting great exposure, and also getting the message out through our newspaper connections, and our partners at the **Radio Network**.







Mark Broadhurst, who was a schoolboy Kiwi to Australia in 1970 (with Baxendale and John Smith) went on to represent NZ at the highest level from 1979.

NOTES ON THE AUSTRALIAN TOUR

Much has been written, spoken or thought about the brief Tour to Australia in 1972 by a Kiwi side. The favourite adjectives regarding that venture have been "ridiculous, foolish, hopeless, suicidal, another Dunkirk," etc., etc. But nevertheless, when it was in the melting pot and on the drawing board, there was a two-fold purpose behind it.

Firstly there was a demand by the Rugby League Public to see the victorious 1971 Kiwis in action and secondly N.Z. was morally obliged to reciprocate the short 1971 Australian Tour to N.Z. Out of this second factor, both countries hoped to use these matches to more adequately prepare their National Teams for the World Cup series to be staged in France later in the year.

Well, the plan was laid and here were the dates:

Saturday June 17 1971: Kiwis v South Island at Christchurch. Sunday June 18: Kiwis v North Island at Wellington.

Saturday June 24: N.Z. v The Rest at Auckland.

The Tourists were then named.
Tuesday July 4: N.Z. v N.S.W. Country at Canberra. Saturday July 8: N., v Australia at Sydney. Saturday July 15: N.Z. v Australia at Brisbane

Manager Jack Williams and Coach Lory Blanchard discovered right from the outset that the path they were treading was very rough and

From their 1971 Champions, there were the following defections:
Henry Tatana and Bernie Lowther had been exported to Aussie. Mike
McClennan and Tony Kriletich had retired, Because of injuries, Boh
McGuinn, Ray Williams, Ken Stirling and Robert Orchard were late
scratchings, whilst Bill Burgoyne had been chosen as specialist hooker
for the North Island and to pull him out of that side at the eleventh
hour would disrupt that team too much.

So off they went with their remaining 17 players and after a griffs half against the South Island, the Kiwis eventually won by 10.

Points for the Kiwis were: Tries by M. Brereton 2, J. Whittaker, M. Eade, G. Smith, P. Orchard and D. Sorensen 2. Goals by P. Orchard 3.

South Island's came from tries by J. Hibbs and B. Bigwood, Goals by M. O'Donnell 2.

On to Wellington and we in the North watched on a T.V. link and saw a lively North Island team pressurize the Kiwis to such an extent that the final score was Kiwis 20, North Island 13,

North Island team was: J. Wilson, R. Cranston, P. Metete, J. Buchan, E. Wulf, F. Schulster, K. Barry, S. Brewster, B. Burgoyne, R. Paul, R. Tupaca, T. Chetham, R. Bolton, K. Pittman, P. Gurnick.

Kiwi's points were from tries by M. Brereton 3, D. Williams. Goals by W. Deacon 3 and J. Whittaker.

North's tries were scored by E. Wulf, S. Brewster and R. Bolton. Two goals by J. Wilson.

As a result of those games the N.Z. selectors Lory Blanchard, Travis Hardwick and Des Barchard lined out the following teams for the Final Trial at Carlaw Park: N.Z.: J. Whittaker, R. Cranston, R. Christian, D. Williams, M.




New Zealand's total number of Kiwis stands at 780 after the 2013 Rugby League World Cup.



The League wants to increase the profile of the game in schools and address the drop in numbers of players once they they go to high school.




