## Call for Rams fans to show support

he South Island provincial league final has been set down for Saturday afternoon in Invercargill and Southland league officials are hopeful the province gets in behind their team.

The Rams topped the round-robin series on Saturday night with a thrilling 30-26 win over the Tasman Titans and will now play Canterbury at Rugby Park at 2.30pm. It will be the first time the South Island final has been staged in Invercargill, and the Rams are also attempting to win it for the first time.

Southland District Rugby League president Cheryl Officer - who also is the Rams team manager - hoped the Southland community would get in behind the team. She described Saturday as one of the biggest games in Southland rugby league's history. It also comes on the back of two notable victories over Canterbury and Tasman in the past couple of weeks at Rugby Park.

"We are hoping a lot of people will come along to watch. We are going to give it a big push this week," Officer said.

#### Rams attract attention

The Southland Rams fairytale 2014 season has captured the interest of even New Zealand's most high-profile league folk. They host the final this weekend against Canterbury at Rugby Park in Invercargill.

Their run, for a province not known for its league exploits, has prompted messages of support from some of the biggest names in New Zealand league.

Vodafone Warriors coach Andrew McFadden and captain Simon Mannering were among those providing good wishes before last Saturday's game, as was Kiwis' coach Stephen Kearney.

Sir Peter Leitch, aka the Mad Butcher, has been the most vocal supporter of the Rams efforts in recent weeks.

Via cellphone Leitch spoke to the Rams team in the changing rooms soon after the game, where he described it as "a proud night for Southland rugby league".

#### History making rugby league team, the Southland Rams, have secured a hometown final for the South Island provincial title!

They won a nail-biting game against the Tasman Titans 30-26 at Rugby Park in Invercargill last Saturday night. The win marked the first time the Rams had gone through the competitionis round-robin section unbeaten.

A week earlier at Rugby Park, the Rams scored a historic win when beating Canterbury for the first time. They clash again in the final at Rugby Park on Saturday.

Late in last Saturday's game, the Rams were in trouble when the Titans scored a try to temporarily level the scores at 30-30. However, the referee disallowed the try deeming a forward pass had been made

The Rams with their four-point buffer, defended tenaciously in the final few minutes to win.

Captain Chee Turuwhenua said his men would lift again for the final.

"We've got one more hurdle to go. It'll take a big effort from everyone, we'll be giving it our best," Turuwhenua said.

The comaraderie among Rams players was a strength of the team, coach Greg Dawson said.

"There's a good team spirit. They're out there putting their bodies on the line for each other."

Dawson and Turuwhenua are proud of the way the Rams have performed in all games this year. Key players Josh Gough and Matthew Low will return from injury for the final

"We've got a big one next week and we want to finish the job off," Dawson said.

Titan's coach, Phil Bergman, said the disallowed try extinguished all hope of his team winning last Saturday.

"That was the game for us. When Southland had the ball, we struggled to get it off them."

#### Simon Mannering has capped 2014 by collecting the supreme Vodafone Player of the Year Award for a record fourth time.

It's the second straight year and the third time in the last four seasons he has won.

Mannering was consistently outstanding, appearing in all 24 games and equalling his career-best try tally of nine in a season.

The award was Mannering's second of the night. Earlier he was presented with the SkyCity Legacy Award to mark his milestone 10th NRL season for the club - joining Stacey Jones, Awen Guttenbeil, Lance Hohaia, Jerome Ropati and Manu Vatuvei.

Winger Manu Vatuvei was the Players' Player of the Year as voted on by his peers. Vatuvei had an outstanding year, scoring 17 tries in 23 appearances to lift his career tally to 135 in 194 matches.

That moved him inside the NRL's all-time top 20 tryscorers as he maintained his sequence of being the club's top or top-equal tryscorer in each of the last eight seasons.

He is also only the second player in the competition's history to score 10 or more tries in nine consecutive seasons.

Vatuvei was also named Club Person of the Year for his exceptional all-round contribution on and off the field, especially in the community. He has already won the NRL's Favourite Son Award this year and is a finalist for the NRL's Ken Stephen Medal.

## Q and A with JIM DOYLE

**INTRO:** There'll be no lengthy holiday for Chief Operating Officer for the NRL, Jim Doyle, before he starts as CEO of the NZ Warriors in November. In fact, he's already having to manage his time carefully in Sydney to allow him to plan ahead to his role back in New Zealand - as he explains in this Q and A with **John Deaker**.

- Q) Jim, when do you actually get your feet under the desk working at the **Warriors HQ?**
- A) November the 10th will be my first day on the job.
- Q) Some coaches and CEO's feel hamstrung by previous recruitments made at clubs before they've even arrived. Are you able to have involvement or influence on important decisions like player recruitment before that November 10th date?
- A) One of the things that happened was when I agreed to take on the role I spoke with Wayne, Bill Wavish and Eric - and we agreed that there'd be no staff appointments until I get there. We've put off some staff appointments recently until I get there so we can make sure we have the right people from a staff point-of-view. Then from a playing perspective the good thing being in Australia at the moment is that there's a few hours ahead of the day when you can talk to New Zealand. So I spend a bit of time talking to 'Cappy' early in the morning to talk to him about player rosters and what's happening. So I have a little bit of input but it's very limited.
- Q) So when do you actually move across the Tasman when that communicating with 'Cappy' prior to November the 10th could at least become easier?
- A) We actually move on November the 8th. My last day with the NRL is November the 7th - we fly out on November the 8th - and I start work on November the 10th.
- Q) You're very aware of the strengths and weaknesses of all NRL clubs -What NRL club's systems and structures would you like the Warriors to model themselves on more than any other club - and why?
- A) To be honest I wouldn't actually use just one in particular. As you go across the clubs there's some clubs better than others at certain things – whether that be football, commercial, marketing or membership. So I would use a combination of different clubs - not just one in particular.
- Q) Having been the CEO of the NZRL, how much potential do you think is there for you to improve the relationship between the Warriors and the NZRL?
- A) When at the NZRL I had a good relationship with Wayne (Scurrah). There's no doubt that a strong Warriors will have a positive impact for the game of rugby league right across the country. At the same time a strong NZRL will have a strong impact on the Warriors so it's important that they work together.
- Q) How confident are you that you'll be trusted with the power you want at the Warriors without interference from the board or the owners?

- A) I'm very confident. I think at the end of the day we'll all be working together. We all want the same outcome for the Warriors - to be very consistent on and off the field - and be very professional. That's exactly what the board want and what the owners want. We're all in it together - so we'll all be using collective skills, knowledge and experience to make sure that we get the success.
- Q) The future of the Under 20's Holden **Cup competition is apparently under** threat. This could be a huge loss for the Warriors. How hard will you try in your current role - and when you arrive at the Warriors - to retain this competition?
- A) There's been a lot of speculation out there - and I'm not sure what the speculation is based on. I think everybody in the game knows that to develop talent for the future you have to have pathways. Those pathways start at 16's and 18's and it includes the 20's. It also includes the State Cups like the NSW Cup and Queensland Cup. No one disagrees that

those are the right pathways - so I'm not sure why people are speculating about the demise of the Holden Cup.



A) My eldest daughter is 26 and she's a schoolteacher – and the other one is 22 and works for Westpac. They're living in our house in Auckland at the moment. When we came here we knew we were only here for 2 or 3 years. But when the opportunity came up at the Warriors it became an ideal time to stay involved with the game by moving back home to spend more time with the kids - so that was really the plan.

**OUTRO:** Jim Doyle may not be about to score tries or make tackles. However it will be fascinating to see what influence he can make on the Warriors team in the next few years when critics have often highlighted them "not getting the front office right" as a key reason for the Warriors never getting close to realising the clubs huge potential.

Of course I love NRL finals footy, even without the **Vodafone Warriors**. South Sydney go to the preliminary finals after a 40-24 thrashing of Manly. The *Rabbitohs* were awesome in Friday night's game, bashing their way to a 40-0 lead, before Manly rallied.

Manly hardly had the ball in the first 40 and will have to do a lot better this weekend when they take on the **Bulldogs**, who threw a spanner in the **Storm**'s works by beating them 28-4 on Sunday.

No other club can compete with that record.

Tuimavave-Gerrard was in the second row.

Canberra and Canterbury have been in the finals five times, but failed to qualify this year, while the Roosters were in the play-offs for the fifth time.

#### **NSW Cup side eliminated**

But our other side in the finals series, the NSW Cup team, were over-run by the **Illawarra Cutters**, so come on the **Juniors**, keep our flag flying!

**Dominique Peyroux** and **Agnatius Paasi** returned to New South Wales Cup duty for the Vodafone Warriors, Peyroux in the centres, and Paasi at loose forward, but it was not enough. With the lure of making the competition's last four - and moving within one win of making the September 28 grand final - the Warriors and Illawarra had gone into the game at opposite ends of the form spectrum.

The Warriors sneaked into the finals in eighth while the Cutters ended the season fourth. But the Warriors belied their run by beating the fifth-ranked **Mounties** 36-28 in their opening finals game. The *Cutters* were out of sorts against minor premier Penrith as they slumped to a 42-6 loss last weekend.

It all counted for nothing, with the **Cutters** the better team on the night, but at least the Vodafone Warriors reached the finals at their first attempt with their own team in the NSW Cup.

#### New faces due to be named

Vodafone Warriors head coach Andrew McFadden hopes to announce the two new assistant coaches to replace Ricky Henry and Adam Mogg soon.

"I'm hoping we'll be able to make an announcement in the near future," said McFadden. "Ricky and Adam have made great contributions and I'm grateful. Adam has put his family first, which is only right. It hasn't worked out for him, with his family back in Queensland so he has decided to go home. Ricky has really stepped up to take on more after I was appointed. He has been terrific."

McFadden said he was seeking experienced support staff. "I'm a fairly inexperienced at this level and I recognised during the season that I need the support and advice of people who have been around coaching at the top level longer than I have."

His manager **Peter Brown** asked for the release and the club agreed, with Sam lining up for a spot in Super Rugby with NSW.

Mostly used in the New South Wales Cup over the last three seasons, Sam, 23, made two NRL appearances in 2012, and had one game this year. He played 44 times for the Junior Warriors in 2010 and 2011, and was a member of the club's NYC grand final-winning teams both seasons.

#### **Ten Warriors in Kiwis thinking**

Ten Vodafone Warriors are in the Kiwis' train-on squad for the Four Nations tournament.

Simon Mannering, Manu Vatuvei, Thomas Leuluai, Ben Matulino and Shaun Johnson, are all named.

The others included are Konrad Hurrell, Ngani Laumape, David Fusitu'a, Siliva Havili and Suaia Matagi.

Hurrell represented Tonga at last year's World Cup but has indicated his desire to make the Kiwis.

Matagi, who played for Toa Samoa at the cup, was also named in the Samoans' train-on squad, along with clubmates Carlos Tuimavave, Dominique Peyroux, Michael Sio and Brad Abbey.

Coach Stephen Kearney named 21 players whose clubs missed the NRL playoffs, and further names will be added as more teams are eliminated. The wider squad will consist of about 40 players and the Four Nations roster will be named the week after the grand final.

And Vodafone Warriors prop Jacob Lillyman was named in the Aussie train-on squad too.

#### Pirtek NZRL National Premiership

Two late tries from wing Jeremiah Faaumuumu saved defending champions Akarana Falcons from embarrassment, as they survived a tough examination from the Wellington Orcas 36-22.

With 10 minutes left, the home side were only 26-22 ahead, and were barely holding on. But they were able to manufacture a pair of opportunities for Faaumuumu to capitalise on.

Both sides had gone into the contest having suffered losses last week, Akarana to the Canterbury Bulls, and Wellington to Wai-Coa-Bay Stallions.

The **Central Vipers** continued their turnaround season with a resounding 74-16 win over Northern Swords at Wanganui. After travelling through the 2013 competition without a win, the Hawke's Bay/Taranaki/Manawatu/ Wanganui combination have now registered two wins this year, having accounted for Wellington two weeks ago.

By contrast, the **Swords** have one hand on the wooden spoon, still winless through four rounds.

Meanwhile, Counties Manukau have put daylight between themselves and their rivals so far this season, building on their superiority with a 68-0 romp over Wai-Coa-Bay Stallions in Tauranga.

Unbeaten through last regular season, but knocked over in the final, the Stingrays seem to be on a mission to erase that memory, accounting for their opponents by an average of 55 points. Counties Manukau now face a grand-final rematch against Akarana Falcons next week and still have the premiership's other unbeaten side, the Canterbury Bulls, on their schedule.



## WHATEVER HAPPENED TO FORMER KIWI CAPTAIN, BILL SNOWDEN by Barry Ross, Australian correspondent

Bill Snowden played the first of his 19 Tests at Carlaw Park on 8 July 1961, against Australia. It was a strong Aussie team, including Australian Team of the Century members, Reg Gasnier and Ken Irvine The visitors won the tight match 10-8, drawing the series, after New Zealand had won the first game 12-10.

orn in Auckland in 1935, Bill attended Auckland Grammar and in his senior year was asked to try out for the First XV Rugby side. He was lost to the 15 man game when he wasn't allowed to wear his only pair of football boots. "My boots had aluminium studs and these were not only to be used in the schools rugby games of those days, " he laughed. " We were too poor to buy another pair, so I played soccer in the winter and cricket in the summer." Bill began playing Rugby League with the old City Rovers club as a seven year old, but moved to Ponsonby at age 16, because his junior club did not field senior teams. The talented halfback was playing first grade at 17 and was selected in his first Auckland representative team a few years later for a tour of the South Island. His big break came in 1959 when he was chosen in Cliff Johnson's strong team for the Australian tour.

With a Test match under his belt, Bill left for England and France in late 1961, with a young and enthusiastic Kiwi team, captained by Don Hammond. Britain were the best side in the world at the time and the New Zealanders were not expected to provide them with much opposition but this was certainly not the case. New Zealand belted the Poms 29-11 in the first Test and gave them a hell of

a fright in the other two. They then went to France where they won the series.

Bill was one of the many successes on that tour, playing in all six Tests

Back home in 1962, New Zealand hosted Great Britain after they had thumped Australia to win the series, two Tests to one. But the Kiwis didn't have the same problem, easily winning both Tests, 19-0 and 27-8, with Bill playing a key role in the series victory.

In 1963 he was vice captain of the New Zealand team to Australia, playing in all three Tests. When the Australians came to New Zealand in June 1965, Bill captained the home side in both Tests, with the series being drawn one Test all. The Ponsonby halfback became the first Maori to captain a major New Zealand tour of England and France when he led the 1965 team. He played in the first two Tests, but then suffered a groin tear which kept him on the sidelines for about two months. This was the end of his Test career, with his final game being at Bradford on 23 October 1965.

While Bill was the team's halfback, New Zealand were regarded as the world's best team. From 1936 to 1988, the best Test team in world Rugby League was awarded the Courtney Goodwill trophy. New Zealand held this

trophy from 1960 to 1965 and Bill's 19 Tests were played during this time.

His opposition halfbacks in his Test career included such greats of our game as Alec Murphy, Billy Smith, Arthur Summons, Tommy Smales and Mick Sullivan who made his name as a fearsome British winger.

In the late 1960s, Bill and a few mates came to Australia and he has been living there ever since. In the early days he tried to play with the Sydney Roosters but couldn't obtain a clearance. So he played under another name for Bondi United in the Eastern Suburbs junior league. In 1974 and 1975, he was the Roosters chairman of selectors, when Australian Team of the Century coach, Jack Gibson took them to two successive Premierships. A member of the Men of League, Bill often enjoys a coffee with his 1965 rival Billy Smith, who lives nearby.

"I played two Tests against Billy," he remembered, "and just a few minutes into second first meeting, which we won 7-5, he belted me. But I got him back later in the match."

Bill, who sadly lost his wife a few weeks ago, has a daughter and two grandsons. He lives in the Sutherland Shire not far from Cronulla beach.




