Webster was Parramatta's NYC coach last vear and had two stints as an assistant at Hull Kingston Rovers in England.

"I first became aware of him when I was coaching at Les Catalans in France. He was with Hull Kingston Rovers then and I've kept an eye on him since," he said.

"For such a young coach he has packed in lots of experience in Australia, England and the United States."

After scoring 144 points in 2012 and 147 in 2013, Lino has a career total of 480 in 60 games, leaving the 500-point mark within reach.

Also eyeing a milestone is prop Sam Lisone. He plays his 49th game leaving him on track to reach the 50-game mark in the grand final if the Vodafone Junior Warriors can eliminate Parramatt.

Set to line up at fullback is **Brad Abbey**, who has made good progress after being forced off the field with a hip injury last weekend.

The 17-year-old – he isn't 18 until December 30 - has had an outstanding debut season. He was named the TNT NYC Rookie of the Year at the Vodafone Warriors awards.


Meet the Team for Saturday's NYC Finals




Tuimoala Lolohea: A player destined for a big future in the game, Lolohea left his imprint on the NYC in 2013 when, as an 18-year old, picking up 22 tries playing in all of the Vodafone Junior Warriors' 28 fixtures. His dazzling feet, speed and skill saw him collect the club's TNT NYC Young Player of the Year Award. During his career he has made his mark on the representative scene featuring for the NZ Residents 16s and 18s as well as the Junior Kiwis. A Kelston Boys' High School product, he was named in the club's squad for the inaugural NRL Auckland Nines and has been resigned to the end of the 2017 season. He played in the club's 2014 NRL trials against Gold Coast and Brisbane, scoring two tries against the Titans. While eligible for the NYC again this year and next year as well, Lolohea is being developed in the club's New South Wales Cup team. However, he turned out for the Vodafone Junior Warriors in their third-round match against North Queensland in Townsville, inspiring them to a 50-12 win with a hat-trick.



Metia Lisati: Lisati gave a superb account of himself in his debut NYC season in 2013. In 16 appearances, he snared seven tries in what was only his second season playing the sport. Lisati had played for the Bay Roskill Vikings in 2012 but prior to that he was a dedicated footballer. Educated at Mount Roskill Grammar School, the winger can also fill the depth chart at fullback. After scoring a hat-trick against Cronulla he was promoted to debut for the Vodafone Warriors against the Bulldogs in the New South Wales Cup, only to pick up an ankle injury.



Solomone Kata: Kata arrived in New Zealand from Tonga in 2011. After excelling in the Sacred Heart College First XV, he became another schoolboy rugby union star to switch codes and sign with the Vodafone Warriors for the 2013 season. His NYC career got off to an emphatic start when he scored two tries on debut against South Sydney in April. He continued this vein of form, finishing his first campaign with 11 tries from 17 appearances. His handy goalkicking skills meant that he posted 88 points in total for the club.



Mason Lino: Lino caught the eye in the club's NYC trials to earn a spot in the 2012 Vodafone Junior Warriors squad. Not many weeks past his 18th birthday, the goal-kicking halfback was called in to make his NYC debut in the second-round clash against Parramatta and finished the season as team's top points-scorer with 144 points in 23 games. Lino, whose club roots are with the Marist Saints, was again a heavy points-scorer in 2013 despite a lengthy injury lay-off. He bucketed 147 points for the club, taking his total after 2013 to 281 from 41 appearances. Mason is currently studying a Bachelor of Business at AUT, having completed his schooling at Avondale College.



Sam Lisone: A huge young forward standing 198cm tall, Sam broke into the NYC team in 2010, making 18 appearances in his debut season. He excelled with his exceptional off-loading skills, creating countless opportunities and providing the key ball in numerous tries. His only try of the year was in the 42-28 grand final victory over South Sydney. He again shone in the NYC in 2011, helping the side to a second consecutive premiership. He appeared in 26 of their 27 matches, scoring 10 tries. After finishing his NYC career with 44 appearances, Sam was upgraded to the fulltime NRL squad for 2012. After initially appearing in every match for the Auckland Vulcans in the New South Wales Cup, he made his NRL debut in unusual circumstances against Newcastle in July. He had been chosen as 18th man when, right at the end of the warm-up, he was called in to play after original choice Steve Rapira strained his hamstring. Late in the match. Lousi went on the field to become Vodafone Warrior No 175. Also on the field with him at the time was older brother Sione; it was the first time they'd been in the same side together since they had lined up for St Paul's College, New Zealand's renowned rugby league nursery. Sam's second season in the NRL was hindered by injury problems, with ankle and knee issues limiting his playing time.




Ngataua Hukatai: Ngataua signed with the Vodafone Warriors after excelling in rugby union as a schoolboy. A standout at wing for the prestigious King's College First XV, he decided to make the switch to rugby league after being scouted by the Vodafone Warriors. In 2012 Hukatai made his debut for the club in the NYC play, starting his career in the 13-man game by playing in 24 matches and scoring 11 tries. He translated this success into his 2013 NYC season, scoring seven tries in 21 matches and playing in the grand final against Penrith. Injury has disrupted his 2014 plans.





Marata Niukore: Marata impressed playing for Aorere College in Auckland's inaugural College Rugby League First XIII competition last year. He trialled with the Sydney Roosters' SG Ball side but returned home to join the Howick Hornets in Auckland's Fox Memorial premiership. He was called in for his Vodafone Junior Warriors debut against Penrith in June. He scored a try that day playing in the centres but has since been used in the second row. He has scored four tries in 12 games.

Kurt Robinson: Robinson graduated from Hutt Valley High School with his sights set firmly on making the Vodafone Warriors. The former Petone Panthers hooker and Wellington Orcas representative started gaining traction in 2012 and was brought into the Vodafone Junior Warriors for 2013, making six starts and scoring a try. A former basketball player in high school, Kurt is an accomplished hooker who has gone to the next level in 2014, becoming a first-choice selection under new Vodafone Junior Warriors coach Stacey Jones.





Nathaniel Roache: Educated at Mount Albert Grammar School, Nathaniel's junior club was Richmond. Excelled for Mount Albert Grammar in the College Rugby League First XIII competition last year. He has come through the development system, making his NYC debut at standoff for the Vodafone Junior Warriors in their first-round clash against Parramatta in March. He has been used at standoff, hooker and in the centres, appearing in 22 of the team's 26 matches so far and scoring eight tries.





Kouma Samson: Kouma had an eventful year of football in 2012 as he broke into the NYC side and was named NZRL Under-18 Player of the Year for his efforts with the Glenora Bears. The second-rower was also selected as team captain for the NZRL representative squad that toured Queensland at year's end. Samson, a graduate of Green Bay High School, was able to solidify his place in the Vodafone Junior Warriors for 2013 and he did not disappoint. He averaged close to 100 metres a game in his 16 appearances, including a stint in the NYC grand final.




Jazz Tevaga: A Papakura Sea Eagles junior, Jazz was educated at Papakura High School. He earned a Vodafone Warriors contract after standing out in the club's open NYC trial last year, going on to make his debut in the second round encounter with St George Illawarra at Eden Park in March. He has gone on to make 18 appearances this season, scoring three tries. Initially used as an interchange dummy half option, Jazz has been used more extensively at loose forward in the back end of the season.

NZ rugby v rugby league's attitude to drop-kicks doesn't add up

Brad Abbey: Brad Abbey, at just 17 years of age, is rated one of the club's brightest prospects. A skilful fullback, he moved from Western Springs College to the renowned rugby league nursery St Paul's College, setting alight a career which has already seen him attract interest from many other clubs. He recently signed a new two-year contract with the Vodafone Warriors through to the end of the 2016 season. He made his NYC debut in round one of the 2014 campaign against the Parramatta Eels, going on to score a hattrick in the club's sixth-round clash against the Bulldogs. Outside of rugby league Abbey is aspiring to work as a police officer.



Adam Tuimavave-Gerrard: He is another member of rugby league's well-known Tuimavave clan, initially joining his cousin Carlos in the 2012 NYC squad. Former Kiwis Tony and Paddy Tuimavave are his uncles while 2008 Kiwi and ex-Vodafone Warrior Evarn Tuimavave is another cousin. Adam made 10 appearances in 2012 when he alternated between the centres and the back row. Yet another Marist Saints junior, he scored four tries against Manly in 2013 and mustered a total of 10 tries from 24 matches. He is now one of the 2014 squad's 'veterans'. With his career tally now topping 40 games, he is set this season to join the select group of players who have appeared in 50 NYC matches for the club.



It was no fluke when Trent Hodkinson successfully kicked 2 dropkicks within 8 minutes of each other to send his Canterbury-Bankstown team into this week's NRL semi-finals.

Hodkinson has proved his ability to remain cool under pressure this season in the drop-kick situation many times. The Warriors' round 6 match was one of many times during the season where he's stepped up to produce "clutch" execution of the one-pointer when required by his team.

That one situation can be isolated as THE defining moment for BOTH the Warriors and Bulldogs seasons. Simply put - if Leulaia had got his attempt earlier (everything else in the season remaining equal) the Warriors end up in 7th place and the Bulldogs end up where the Warriors did in 9th place.

The ironic thing is that the one-pointer has become accepted as such a crucial part of rugby league - yet in New Zealand rugby union we barely view drop-kicks as part of the game! The booing they often receive certainly sums up the attitude most people have towards them.

Even watching Joel Stransky's heartbreaking dropkick in extra time in the 1995 World Cup and Jonny Wilkinson's last – minute winner in the 2003 World Cup seem to have hardly changed our nation's negative attitude towards drop-kicks.

It's hard to work out exactly why this started - and why it continues. One possible conclusion that stands out from the rest is that we turn a blind eye to it and think we don't need it - almost like we're "too good for it."

Some things sadly become accepted over time. It seemed stunning when the coach of Australia's victorious World Cup rugby team in 1999, Rod McQueen, became lauded by people for "working out" how crucial drop-kicks were to re-starts in

goal scenario in a match. Individuals might practice it at times, but it's totally another thing for coaches to actually create match situations and dedicate training time towards teams setting a stable platform for a smooth drop-kick execution.

The way the Americans look at sport it would be nearly as tough as them understanding the rules of rugby for them to fathom our Nation's attitude towards rugby drop-kicks: "Yes, we're the greatest rugby nation in the world... In rugby tries get 5 points, conversion kicks get 2 and penalty kicks get 3... oh and there's this thing called a drop-kick where you get 3 points - but you probably won't see that happen because most of our team's don't even practice it."

It would be a huge surprise if the Bulldogs were able to win the NRL title after qualifying in 7th place this year. With the squad they have you could argue their year is already another coaching victory for Des Hasler. This week Hasler goes up against another of the most respected coaches in the NRL when they take on Ivan Cleary's Penrith team.

It's more than a coincidence that Ivan's well-coached team also won their last match with a drop-kick - on that occasion coming off the boot of Jamie Soward against the heavily favoured Sydney Roosters. Like the Bulldogs, Penrith aren't a star-studded team. Their coach has them very well organised though and this has enabled them to also win many tight matches with drop kicks this year.

Both teams have also demonstrated other "go-to" options in addition to Hodkinson and Soward. Josh Reynolds won the Bulldogs a match with a one-pointer

rugby games : ie that the team that retrieved the kick-off massively increased their chances of scoring. Should that really have been viewed as such rocket-science at the time !?

At least rugby players have historically practiced drop-out re-starts - albeit not nearly as much as McQueen thought they should have. In comparison, many former rugby union players (and coaches) would struggle to remember one training session where their team actually trained for a dropearlier in the year, while Penrith have also utilised Matt Moylan to edge them to victory in 2014.

Needless to say, if a drop-kick separates the Bulldogs and Penrith at the weekend it'll be no fluke. Elvis' Original TCB Band and John Rowles together for Historic NZ Tour

For the first time ever the legendary *Original Elvis TCB Band* joins New Zealand music icon John Rowles on an historic, nine-centre, New Zealand tour.

This once in a lifetime concert tour brings together these living legends, playing their greatest songs and more, featuring some of the most famous **Elvis Presley** and **John Rowles** hits, including *Love Me Tender*, *Heartbreak Hotel*, *Suspicious Minds*, *If I Only Had Time* and *Cheryl Moana Maree*, as well as other all-time classics from the era.

The TCB Band was credited with bringing a new lease of life to Elvis' rock'n'roll sound and creating mesmerising shows including the legendary 1973 'Aloha from Hawaii' concert that was broadcast around the world to an estimated audience of one billion people.

Promoter **Simon Kemp-Roberts** met TCB band drummer Ronnie Tutt when he toured New Zealand as drummer for **Neil Diamond** and since then he's been searching for an opportunity to bring the whole band to New Zealand.

"I met John Rowles who was planning 3 shows to promote his new album and I realised that here was my chance to bring together a legendary band and legendary singer, to play music that shaped a generation and has stood the test of time".




