McCaw's century is a statistic with plenty of significance

any insignificant sporting statistics get given more media coverage than they should. News last week that **Richie McCaw** was approaching his 100th test as an **All Black** captain provided a significant statistic that rightfully stopped many people in their tracks and received the type of exposure it deserved. A key measure of greatness in most sports is longevity. McCaw's lengthy career at the highest level is made even more remarkable due to the high-impact position he's played in for most of his career.

To give some perspective to McCaw's unique achievement of 100 tests as captain it's worth comparing him to the second on international rugby's list: the now-retired Irishman **Brian O'Driscoll**, who led his country 84 times. Not only is McCaw already way ahead of O'Driscoll's number of matches as captain but the Irishman's success with his team was nothing like the New Zealanders. Since McCaw first captained the *All Blacks* in 2004, they've won 88 per cent of their games with him in charge. His captaincy record reads: 100 games played, 88 won, 10 losses and 2 draws.

O'Driscoll managed 52 wins, 31 losses draws and 1 draw from his 84 matches as captain – leaving him with a 62.5% winning record.

McCaw's success rate has obviously been helped a lot by the fact he's led New Zealand's rugby team and not the national team in a weaker sport like cricket. The most successful **Black Caps**' skipper New Zealand has produced was **Stephen Fleming**. Like McCaw, he was also only 23 when he was elevated from captaining the Canterbury province to fulfilling the same duty for the

National team.

Naturally, Fleming's winning percentage of 35% doesn't make nearly as flattering reading as that of McCaw's – though it does read better when broken down to the 28 wins, 27 losses and 25 draws that he had when in charge; for him to have won more tests than he lost is not only unprecedented but is astonishing when compared to most other New Zealand cricket captains.

Fleming was also fortunate in the same way McCaw has been to have had great players play under him. Players like **Dan Vettori**, **Chris Cairns** and **Nathan Astle** carved out records that see them remembered as some of our greatest ever players. In McCaw's case, a huge amount of his success has come when playing in the same team as **Dan Carter**, **Ma'a Nonu** and **Kieran Read** – 3 players that will also go down as all-time greats of New Zealand rugby.

One of the biggest compliments that can be paid to McCaw is how noticeable it is when he's not in the *All Blacks* – much like the *All Blacks* missed the experience and composure of Carter and Nonu in their backline against Wales at the weekend. It would remain one of the biggest concerns for the coaching staff of the *All Blacks* going in to next year's World Cup that a serious injury to McCaw could dramatically impact on the quality and confidence of their team.

One fascination post-2015 will be whether McCaw retires. He will probably wait till after the 2015 World Cup to make that evaluation in his own time. The result in the World Cup might influence his decision considering he'd ideally want to cap off such a successful international career with some sort of victory in the *All Black* jersey.

It appears likely that the *All Blacks* Head Coach, **Steve Hansen**, will stay on. Recent statements from both Hansen and the NZRU's CEO, **Steve Tew**, have indicated this. It would provide a different challenge for Hansen to carry on in the role should McCaw retire considering he'd have been fortunate enough to do all his 12 years with the *All Blacks* (as Assistant Coach and Head Coach) with McCaw in his *All Blacks* teams.

The biggest reservation about allowing Hansen to continue as *All Blacks* coach going in to the "post-McCaw" era is that it creates a dangerous precedent; Allowing Hansen to continue in the job for a few more years is likely to see even more of our top coaches get impatient and head overseas – while also giving those already overseas like *Joe Schmidt* and *Warren Gatland* less reason to consider ever returning to New Zealand. While Hansen deserves credit for his very successful tenure with the *All Blacks*, he has had an embarrassment of player depth at his disposal compared to all other international coaches through this period.

The path that McCaw takes when he retires will be interesting to watch. He doesn't appear to be a player that will get into coaching – and there's sure to be no shortage of options available to him. Only one thing is certain: When McCaw does retire **John Key** won't mess around long giving him the Knighthood he already offered him after the 2011 World Cup – and very few people will have deserved the honour as much as "Sir Richie" will.

Rotorua to host trial

Several players from the *Kiwis'* champion Four Nations squad will feature when the Vodafone Warriors take on Penrith in an NRL trial at Rotorua on Saturday, February 14 (3pm kick-off).

Between them the two sides have nine Four Nations winners, including Vodafone Warriors Simon Mannering, Manu Vatuvei and Shaun Johnson plus Penrith's Dean Whare and ex-Vodafone Warrior Lewis Brown.

The Vodafone Warriors' second trial ahead of their 20th anniversary season in 2015 will be their first in Rotorua for four years. In 2011 they beat Parramatta 24-4, while in 2010 they accounted for the Roosters 26-8.

The 2015 Valentine's Day match will be the central focus of a 'Festival of Rugby League'.

Vodafone Warriors head coach Andrew McFadden has welcomed the chance to have the team on show in Rotorua. "It's always good to get around the country and give members and fans the chance to see the boys up close. It's a while since the team has been to Rotorua, and the players are looking forward to it."

Apart from Mannering, Vatuvei and Johnson the Vodafone Warriors had Thomas Leuluai, Suaia Matagi, Siliva Havili and new signing Bodene Thompson in the Kiwis' 24-man Four Nations squad, while Penrith winger Dallin Watene-Zelezniak was originally selected before being ruled out with injury.

Our first trial is against the Titans on the Gold Coast, so the Rotorua trial is set to give fans their first chance to see new signings Ryan Hoffman, Matt Allwood and Thompson. Hoffman was in Australia's Four Nations squad, along with Penrith's Josh Mansour and Matt Moylan.

The quota of Four Nations players in contention to feature in Rotorua doesn't end there either with the Vodafone Warriors also boasting England fullback Sam Tomkins and Toa Samoa utility Dominique Peyroux.

The 'Festival of Rugby League' will feature community activities across the weekend, plus a nines tournament and age group fixtures on game day.

Tickets are on sale through Ticketmaster. They can be bought at Ticketmaster outlets nationwide (including the Sir Howard Morrison Performing Arts Centre in Rotorua), on line at www.ticketmaster.co.nz or by calling 0800 111 999. Prices are \$20 for adults, \$7.50 for kids, \$45 for a family pass (two adults and three kids) and \$70 per person for the corporate lounge including food service and own cash bar.

Thais tackle the great game!

hen you think of the Kingdom of Thailand thoughts of a gracious, smiling people, gold laden Buddha statues in magnificent temples and a backpackers party paradise in Bangkok come to mind. Add to that great tasting food and you wouldn't be far wrong. When thinking of Thailand in terms of sport, a growing rugby league competition is probably not first and foremost for most sports fans. But the great game is here and it is finding its feet with Asia's first domestic competition being run in Bangkok.

A week after the Four Nations final in New Zealand the **Thailand Rugby League** played its final round of club footy in the nation's capital to decide its grand finalists. This rugby league traveller got to catch up with the man who has made a lot of personal sacrifices to make it all happen in a foreign land.

Aussie ex-pat and Thailand Rugby League Chairman and founder, **Shannon Crane** has had the mammoth task of making it all come together. Crane has also been working to cater for the increased interest in Rugby League in

Thailand with planned expansion for next season.

2015 and if the interest levels are as expected in the Thai capital a further two sides will be added, one in Greater Bangkok and a second Pattaya based team for 2015." Crane explains how important the new domestic league is to the game in Thailand. "The domestic league is the final piece of the puzzle when it comes to developing the game in the Kingdom. We have been running coaching clinics for school boy aged kids in Central Thailand in Bangkok and Pattaya, Chiang Mai in the north and Phuket in the south since 2012."

"We have Chiang Mai and Phuket entering the league in

"We had to postpone our 5 week University League due to the political instability affecting mostly the Bangkok area but the domestic league is where we get 17-35 year old Thai players working under rugby league coaches with some Australian, New Zealand and European based players helping to bring the Thai player's skill levels along. The TRL domestic competition will culminate with their grand final at Boonyachinda Stadium, Bangkok 13

December kicking off at 7pm.

The Thai national team have already played international fixtures facing Greece last year and recording a victory over Norway at home last month whilst Serbia have committed to a test match in Thailand 2015.

Administratively, TRL are currently working towards meeting the Rugby League International Federation (RLIF) accreditation. The RLIF accreditation starts with Observer, Affiliated and then Full Member status. It takes many years of stable local competition and growth amongst other things before full member status is granted by the RLIF.
