Vodafone Warriors vs Cronulla Sharks

ING Jonathan Wright will make his 100th NRL appearance and Dominique Peyroux will start in the centres for the suspended Konrad Hurrell in the Vodafone Warriors clash with Parramatta on Saturday (5 pm NZT).

Called on to the bench for his 43rd NRL appearance and his first this season is utility forward Sione Lousi, while record try scorer Manu Vatuvei has been named on the left wing in the hope he might recover from his sternum injury.

The rest of the side is unchanged, with the same starting pack named for the ninth consecutive match this season.

Hurrell is unavailable for the next three games after we decided not to contest the grade three dangerous contact offence he was charged with after his collision with Cronulla forward Anthony Tupou. His absence has opened the way for Peyroux to come into the centres. "Dom has been doing a job for us on the bench and has worked for an opportunity like this," assistant coach Andrew Webster said.

"We're not going to have Konrad for a few weeks so this is a big chance for him. With Dom going into the centres Sione comes on to the bench and gives us some versatility. And we're still hoping Manu can come through."

In his 99th appearance last week Wright, 28, had the satisfaction of scoring a try – his third in as many weeks – and celebrating victory against his previous club. Now he is preparing for his 100th at his original NRL club, having made his debut for the Eels in 2009.

After two seasons with Parramatta he had two with Canterbury-Bankstown in 2011-2012 (appearing in the 2012 grand final), and then two with Cronulla in 2013 and 2014.

Milestones are also in view for prop Jacob Lillyman, who is five short of his 200th career game, while second rower Bodene Thompson makes his 95th appearance this week, and halfback Shaun Johnson his 93rd. With his remarkable match-winning try and two goals against Cronulla Johnson is now only 25 points short of reaching 500 in his career.

The Vodafone Warriors climbed into the top eight with their fourth win of the season last week – their second away victory – and sit eighth on eight points. The Eels are only two points back but lie 15th on the ladder, having lost their last two to the Storm and Broncos.

Just two points covers the 10

teams from seventh (Roosters) to last (Manly).

The Vodafone Warriors have a bye in the 11th round before facing Newcastle on May 31 in their first match at Mt Smart in more than a month (4pm kick-off).

Some Shaun Johnson Magic

He has copped plenty about not being at his best, including some who have even called for his demotion to the NSW Cup side, but on Saturday night Shaun Johnson brought out the magic to give us a last-second 20-16 win over Cronulla – and to almost give the old Butcher a heart attack.

I was spitting tacks until the final seconds, when suddenly my mood shifted from gloomy to exhilarated

You will all have seen it but to recap, with 10 minutes to go it was locked at 10-10. But from the 72nd minute the game exploded into life when Vodafone Warriors centre Solomone Kata - on the wing for an injured Manu Vatuvei - dived over.

To be fair, I might have had a few unkind things to say minutes earlier when he blew a try in the same corner, failing to ground the ball.

Johnson missed the conversion but we had the lead with six to go.

But that damned Andrew Fifita – who was exceptional throughout - thundered his way over for a try that when Valentine Homes added the extras, should have been curtains for us.

Cronulla were hooping and hollering at 16-14 and celebrating their get out of jail great escape, and I was wondering what it takes to win.

I should have had more faith because Shaun was about to prove why he is so highly rated.

A short restart saw Cronulla regather, and really it should have been all over.

Jeff Robson kicked, and Ryan Hoffman charged it down, scooped it up and shot downfield like a scalded cat, before being scragged 25 metres out.

The Vodafone Warriors had a huge line-up to the right. The ball went that way and got to Johnson, who cut back off his right foot, exploded across field and then bounced off his left, cutting a swathe through more than half the Sharks side.



It was one of the best match-winning tries I've ever seen. He added the conversion to give us an unlikely 20-16 win.

One of the most exciting – if nerve-racking – games I have seen since I have been a supporter.

Three Cheers For Ryan Hoffman

It is hardly surprising that Shaun Johnson has got all the plaudits for the amazing try he scored at the death to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat.

Back Into The Eight

Our coach Andrew McFadden was desperate to recover from the back-to-back losses to the Cowboys and Titans, results that saw us sink to 13th with a three wins-five losses record after eight rounds.

And those were figures that had plenty grumbling about his tenure. It is a fickle world the NRL and it is fair enough that fans expect to see players fighting to the end, if they can't win.

That has not been the case in every outing, and I think we have to acknowledge that.

But such is the congested nature of the table that our win over the Sharks launched us all the way back into 8th.

Defensive Effort Much Improved

It is nothing to be proud of that going into the game on Saturday we were averaging giving up 22-plus points in each of our last five games.

But I thought our effort in defence, and perhaps something of the Kiwi spirit rubbed off on the boys, was a big step up.

Obviously we only conceded 16 points, but we were also much more committed and fierce in the defensive line. And best of all, we looked like we had a bit of structure too.



Penalties Were A Blight

As you know, I regularly preach getting off the back of the officials. But fair go. Saturday night was ridiculous. Going into the game the Vodafone Warriors were actually the least penalised them in the NRL – something I take great heart from because we all know penalties have cost us dearly in the past, and we constantly get battered for lack of discipline.

We had been averaging only five a game.

On Saturday night we had given up eight in 20-odd minutes, at least two of them totally baffling me, and the commentators.

By the end of the game we had conceded a massive 11.

And it is not as if it was one-sided. Cronulla gave up 10 penalties too.

The whistle threatened to ruin the game and I did think it was a tough watch at times.

Old Boy Dots Down

The Vodafone Warriors Jonathan Wright scored against his old club on Saturday, going over in the corner from a pretty good ball from Tuimoala Lolohea.

It must have been sweet for the former Shark, who has now got three in as many games, and who might even be starting to win some of the doubters over, especially when he also did remarkably well to hold up Mitch Brown in-goal.

Manu Builds His Tally

While Wright was going in against his old club, many Vatuvei's big

grin was in evidence too. The giant crossed for his seventh try in nine games this season, taking his tally to and 142 in 203 matches.

There was a significant injury concern though when we lost Vatuvei to a chest injury. He played on for a while before being forced off, spending the night clasping an ice pack to his chest.

NSW Cup Side Up To Third

A strong second half display carried the Vodafone Warriors to a 36-22 win over Manly on Saturday, taking us up to third in the New South Wales Cup.

We trailed 10-0 early but by halftime we had it back to 10-8 and were looking much better. The second half was another story, as we piled on five tries and 28 points to surge to our sixth win in nine games.

Centre David Fusitu'a was again prominent, scoring a double, giving him five tries in three NSW Cup games.

Also picking up a double was interchange prop Nathaniel Peteru, while Mason Lino made an impressive comeback from offseason shoulder surgery, scoring a try and kicking three goals from three attempts.

The Vodafone Warriors take on Wentworthville in the curtain-raiser to the NRL team's game against Parramatta at Pirtek next Saturday.

The Vodafone Warriors NYC side was beaten by a23-22 by Cronulla, and credit where it is due, the Sharks played really well.

Black Sticks Outmuscled By Korea In Hobart

THE Black Sticks Men have been beaten 3-1 by Korea in their final game at the International Challenge in Tasmania.

New Zealand had plenty of possession but couldn't find a way to get quality shots on goal against a solid Korean defence.



The Black Sticks could only muster one goal with striker Jacob Smith finding the back of the net off a penalty corner deflection in the 58th minute.

Head coach Colin Batch said it was frustrating that they couldn't convert their possession into scoring opportunities.

"We should have had more goal shots from our possession but we struggled in doing that," he said.

"Early errors and poor passing and receiving allowed Korea to get away from us. We showed spirit in the second half but couldn't convert any chances."

Korea opened the scoring in the ninth minute when Kim Juhun hit home from the field, helping his side to a 1-0 halftime lead.

Penalty corner flicker Jang Jonghyun scored twice in the space of seven minutes in the second half to push Korea out to a 3-0 buffer with just 10 minutes remaining.

New Zealand scored a consolation goal two minutes out from fulltime when Smith hit home from a deflection.

The Black Sticks fly home to Auckland tomorrow for an intense two weeks of training before the team departs for the World League Semi-Final in Argentina on 25 May.

The team to compete in Buenos Aires will be announced within the next 10 days.



Black Sticks Defeated Again By Kookaburras

THE Black Sticks Men have suffered a 5-2 defeat in their second game against hosts Australia at the International Challenge in Tasmania.

It was an up tempo game which saw both sides create plenty of scoring opportunities, while the Kookaburras managed to capitalise on more of them.



The Black Sticks scored their first goal early in the second quarter with a field goal from Shea McAleese before Nick Haig converted the team's only penalty corner of the night in the 56th minute.

Devon Manchester played the second half in goal for the Kiwis and made some outstanding saves, while 21-year-old George Muir was impressive in the midfield.

Head coach Colin Batch said it was a much improved performance from Tuesday's 3-0 loss.

"We created a lot more scoring opportunities tonight and we were a lot better than our first game against Australia," he said.

"Although we only managed one penalty corner, we did have some very good goal shots and that was something that we targeted as needing improvement.

"Because our mindset was a lot more attacking we left ourselves more open defensively, so that's a balance we still need to perfect as well as being more diligent with one-on-one battles."

Australia made the most of two penalty corners in the opening quarter with Chris Ciriello converting in the fourth minute and Blake Govers flicking in from the top of the circle eight minutes later.

McAleese pulled one back for the Black Sticks with a field goal early in the second quarter before Trent Mitton responded to take the Kookaburras into halftime with a 3-1 lead.

New Zealand pushed hard throughout the second half and the hard work finally paid off in the 56th minute when Haig flicked low and into the right corner.

The Kookaburras managed two more goals of their own though, with Jamie Dwyer delivering one minute before three quarter time and Tim Deavin scoring 11 seconds from fulltime.

The Black Sticks play their final game in Hobart against Korea at 5pm tomorrow night (NZ time).

The International Challenge is important preparation for the World League Semi-Final in Argentina next month, where the Black Sticks have an opportunity to qualify for the 2016 Rio Olympics.





Black Sticks Women Named for World League Semi Final

BLACK Sticks Women's head coach Mark Hager has announced his side to compete at the FIH World League Semi-Final in Belgium next month.

The Kiwis are among 10 sides competing for a place in the World League Final, while the tournament also doubles as an opportunity to qualify for the 2016 Rio Olympics with a top three placing guaranteeing an automatic berth.

The backline defence will be strengthened with the return of experienced goalkeeper Sally Rutherford who has recovered from a broken toe which has kept her out of action for the past few months.

Canterbury's Sophie Cocks is back in the side following a recent illness, while versatile midfielder Julia King has earned a call-up thanks to a strong club season in England which saw her take out MVP in the final.

Striker Kirsten Pearce (12 caps) will play in her first major international tournament having impressed during the recent Hawke's Bay Cup.

The side is captained by Anita Punt as part of a leadership group also including Sam Charlton and Stacey Michelsen.

Head coach Mark Hager said the development of his squad over the past few months has been pleasing with competition for spots very fierce.

"We've got a good mix of experience and youth with the likes of Anita, Stacey, Gemma and Sam while some of the younger players have really put their hand up," he said.

"The squad is certainly developing well and we saw that at the Hawke's Bay Cup where Amelia Gibson played really well in goal and Gemma showed some top form, creating enormous scoring opportunities for us up front. Kirsten also performed well and stood up in the semi final and final against Korea and Australia.

"You add to that the returning players like Sally, Julia and Sophie and we have a solid platform to perform well in Belgium."

Pearce said she was delighted to be selected and was looking forward to going head-to-head with some of

the best teams in the world.

The 23-year-old made her debut against Canada in February and has swiftly progressed into one of the side's top attacking options.

"It's been a crazy ride so far but I'm really excited to go away with a great bunch of girls and play against the world's best," she said.

"We will go into World League pretty confident. I think we played well in Hawke's Bay and while the final result wasn't what we were after, the improvement we've had over the past few months has been amazing and it's nice to be part of it."

New Zealand is joined in Pool B at the tournament by Australia, Belgium, India and Poland while Pool A consists of Netherlands, Korea, Japan, Italy and Azerbaijan.

The World League format sees New Zealand play four pool games ahead of a crucial sudden-death quarter final against a Pool A opponent.

The Black Sticks are currently in a hard training phase before departing on 9 June to play two warm-up tests against Netherlands ahead of the World League Semi-Final. First up are relative unknowns Poland at 8:00pm on Saturday 20 June (NZ time).

Code Breaker By Duane Fyfe

Please read this. It is of great concern to me as it should be to all league supporters - Sir Peter Leitch

If you're a hard working volunteer or professional in our game in New Zealand there have probably been times when you've felt frustrated that with all your efforts the game is still not progressing as fast as you would like. Well spare a thought for Sol Mokdad the President of the United Arab Emirates Rugby League.

Sol has been arrested and sits in a Dubai prison charged with fraud after a complaint from UAE Rugby concerning the use of the word 'rugby' by UAE Rugby League. Despite camouflaging the arrest as criminal wrong doings this is a blatant attempt to wipeout rugby league in the oil-rich nation. While the UAE government now appears to view the UAE Rugby League as an illegal organisation.

The charges also include fraudulently using the word 'rugby' to obtain sponsorship for Nissan UAE RL domestic competition that has just been stopped because of these charges. A UAE Rugby statement on the matter decreed that their organization has sole right to use the word rugby.

Sol Mokdad has been the President of UAE Rugby League since 2007 and the national organisation is a constituted member of the Rugby League European Federation (RLEF) under the parent body Rugby League International Federation.

A statement by RLIF chairman Nigel Wood and newly installed CEO David Collier say they are aware of the situation and are working to explain to the UAE government that Rugby League is a sovereign sport, and to secure Mokdad's freedom.

After a series of invitational matches Rugby League in the UAE, under Sol's stewardship, started making solid inroads in 2012 when, interestingly enough, they generated interest in the code in reverse. They started with an International test match against Pakistan, which was followed by a three match representative series The Emirate of Origin between Dubai and the capital Abu Dhabi. This had the desired effect and the first UAE domestic competition was started in 2012 and was run annually after the union season was completed, until its sudden halt last weekend.

Sol's detainment is a tragic result for a volunteer of our game and rugby league in his country of residence. Unfortunately this is not the only country where this type of litigious stifling occurs. Rugby League has been a sovereign sport long before Nelson Mandela was jailed as a political prisoner, Russian leaders created the USSR and the Italians folded a pizza in half and called it calzone. However....as highlighted by Rugby League Planet.

One of the longest drawn out battles has been between the South African Rugby League and the SASCOC (South African Sports Confederation and Olympic Committee). The SASCOC still refuses to recognize Rugby League as a stand-a-lone sport. The reason behind this, and you guessed it was because the SARU (South African Rugby Union) is the only official National Sporting Federation for Rugby in South Africa.

After the Russian Rugby League (RRL) sponsors jumped ship to union when it was announced that Rugby 7's was to feature in the next Olympic games the poor RRL has been in battle with the Russian Ministry of Sports (RMOS) for official recognition so it can access much needed funding to develop the sport. But the Russian Rugby League has been stonewalled by the RMOS with the "only one legitimate rugby code" argument being used.

In Italy, there is a battle raging between the official sanctioned Rugby League body, the Federazione Italiana Rugby League and the rebel body Lega Italia Rugby Football League who have just been ratified by the Italian Rugby Union. The Rugby League International Federation put out a press release earlier this week.

"The RLIF categorically rejects any infringement on the sovereignty of Rugby League and consequently considers FIR's action to be illegitimate. The RLIF has sole responsibility for setting Rugby League's universal standards, laws, regulations and practices, which are disseminated through its regional confederations and members. In Italy, the sole legitimate authority for Rugby League is the Federazione Italiana Rugby League."

Will these attempts to stifle our game and thwart the efforts of its hard working volunteers ever stop, don't hold your breath. In the meantime lets hope the length of Sol's internment pales in significance to the late Nelson Mandela.

History Has Proven That The Future Looks Bright For The Nz Warriors

**GENTLEMAN, I see a Premiership coming for the Warriors. New Zealand Rugby League is booming at the moment... these blokes are just the perfect signings for this football team. They're headed for big things." Matty Johns on The Matty Johns Show, 11th May 2015.

The signings of Roger Tuivasa-Sheck and Isaac Luke the last few weeks have been so significant that NZ Warriors' fans can justifiably expect their 2016 team to not only make the top 4 but also be a genuine title contender.

The NRL has proven time and time again that teams can have the best coach in the world or be stacked with great players but until they've got world-class talent dominating their spine - at hooker, halfback, stand-off and fullback - then they're more likely to be a pretender than a contender come finals time.

Securing a world-class hooker and fullback now means the Warriors' spine for 2016 looks even classier than the Lance Hohaia, Shaun Johnson, James Maloney and Kevin Locke combination that took the Warriors all the way to the Grand Final in 2011. That season was Hohaia's last with the club, Ivan Cleary's last as coach and also John Hart's final year as part of the front office at the Warriors.

The importance of getting your front office right is often referred to as the key element professional sports teams need to rectify before they can progress towards better results. When Jim Doyle became CEO of the Warriors late last year people expected with his impressive track record he'd eventually lead the team back towards better results - but how long that would take was anyone's guess.

To already know by May 2015 that in 2016 the Warriors' spine will include Luke, Johnson, Tuivasa-Sheck and either Thomas Leuluai or Tuimoala Lolohea at Standoff is not only encouraging for Warriors' fans but is also a scary proposition for many rival clubs.

The selection at Standoff will be a crucial one to watch as 2016 rolls round. Maloney demonstrated in 2011 how valuable having the right style of player in the number 6 jersey can be to allow Shaun Johnson to shine. Kieran Foran's been able to do the same for Johnson in the Kiwis.

Moving Leuluai to standoff in 2016 appears to make the most sense when you look at the Warriors' current roster. Of course the Johnson / Lolohea combination is mouth-watering for the unpredictable excitement it would provide, but to get the best out of Johnson Leuluai appears the most sensible option.

We shouldn't totally discount the prospect of Jim Doyle acquiring another standoff to throw in the mix before next season starts. Doyle has respect and good connections in the Australian league community and his playing roster he's already secured for next year will have Aussies more open than ever to the idea of linking up with the Warriors.

Looking even further ahead the other flow-on affect of securing such a world-class spine is that promising young Kiwi's are more likely now to think twice about leaving Auckland or even New Zealand to further their rugby league careers.

The spines of the Melbourne Storm and Manly have been the envy of most NRL clubs the last decade. While Craig Bellamy and Des Hasler can argue they nurtured these spines to make them the great combinations they became, people would also be justified in saying that these situations were just as much about these great players helping to make their coaches great.

From 2016 on Andrew McFadden will have no excuse as coach of the Warriors – he'll have the cattle on board capable of winning the NRL. If he manages to do so you can add it to the long list of sporting successes that started in the front office.


