WENT TO the Vodafone Warriors' 21st Annual Awards at the Sky City Convention Centre on Tuesday night and it was superb.

You will know by now that Ben Matulino was named player of the year for the second time in four years, joining Steve Price (2006-07) and Simon Mannering (2008, 2011, 2013 and 2014) as the only other players who have won more than once.

The rookie of the year went to Tuimoala Lolohea, after a season where he finished with 11 tries including a double in the final match against the Dogs.

Also announced were the two premier awards for the club's New South Wales Cup side, with prop John Palavi winning player of the year and halfback Mason Linothe the rookie award.

The awards began with the club's departing players being acknowledged, and a number of milestones marked, including Shaun Johnson getting his 100-game ring, and a special presentation to Manu Vatuvei for being the first player in NRL history to score 10 tries or more in 10 consecutive seasons.

Rookie NRL prop Albert Vete was awarded Canterbury of New Zealand clubman of the year.

There was a new award too – the Sir Peter Leitch member of the year award - which went to Tauranga's Graeme Lee. I could not be more pleased because he travels to all the games, acts as an ambassador, but best of all, does not run around the place trying to make out he owns the club! Great bloke and well-deserved.

Matulino Becomes Two-Time Winner

BEN MATULINO capped his eighth NRL season by being named the supreme Vodafone Player of the Year Award for the second time in four years at the Vodafone Warriors' 21st Annual Awards at the SKYCITY Convention Centre last night.

The 27-year-old Wellingtonian joins Steve Price (2006 and 2007) and Simon Mannering (2008, 2011, 2013 and 2014) as the only other players who have won the award multiple times.

The other finalists for the award were Mannering and halfback Shaun Johnson, who missed the last six games of the season.

Matulino, first named player of the year in 2012, again imposed himself as one of the NRL's top front rowers in a season when he appeared in 21 matches – the only games he missed were through a threematch suspension – lifting his career tally to 173.

Despite missing those three games, he topped the Vodafone Warriors' lists for most runs (349 for an average of 16.6 a game) and for most metres gained (3245 for an average of 154.5 a game). In the last outing of the season against the Bulldogs he carried the ball 194 metres from 17 runs while he topped 150 metres 12 times with a best of 222 metres against the Titans in round 15.

He was also the club's most prolific off loader with 53, ranking him second among all players in the NRL, while he made 566 tackles averaging 27 a game.

"It was a really tough decision choosing between Ben, Simon and Shaun for the award," said Vodafone Warriors head coach Andrew McFadden.

"In a season that provided its challenges they all made huge efforts for the team but in the end Ben won through. He impressed with the consistent quality of his performances and his durability.

"He's certainly up there with the best few props in the game today and just gets better and better every year."

Of a possible 149 games in the last six seasons Matulino has missed just four through injury – two in 2012 and two in 2014 – and five through suspension. He was the first NYC graduate to appear in both 100 and 150 NRL games.

Vying for the Vodafone NRL Rookie of the Year were centre Solomone Kata, utility Tuimoala Lolohea and props Sam Lisone and Albert Vete with Lolohea taking out the award.

Still NYC eligible this year, the 20-year-old Lolohea had a stellar season finishing with 11 tries including a double in the final match of the campaign against the Bulldogs.

He underlined his versatility by starting 11 games at fullback, five at halfback, four in the centres and three on the wing. He was also singled out as a finalist for the NRL rookie of the year category at the Rugby League Players' Association annual awards.

Also announced were the two premier awards for the club's New South Wales Cup side which was eliminated from the finals on Sunday.

Finalists for the Vodafone NSW Cup Player of the Year were David Bhana, Charlie Gubb, Viliami Kaveinga and John Palavi with the ultra-consistent Palavi receiving the accolade.

The Vodafone NSW Cup Rookie of the Year award was won by halfback Mason Lino, who made his NRL debut late in the season. He headed off the other finalists James Bell, Ata Hingano and Nathaniel Roache.

While the Vodafone Junior Warriors had their awards evening last Wednesday the winners of the two principal accolades were acknowledged last night. Vodafone NYC Player of the Year and Sonny Fai Medal winner Bunty Afoa was presented with his award as was TNT NYC Rookie of the Year Ata Hingano.

The awards presentation began with the club's departing players being acknowledged. Those finishing with the Vodafone Warriors are Sam Rapira, Nathan Friend, Chad Townsend, Sam Tomkins, Sebastine Ikahihifo, Suaia Matagi (departed mid-season), Ngani Laumape, Glen Fisiiahi, Dominique Peyroux, Siliva Havili, Nathaniel Peteru (departed mid-season), David Bhana and Brad Abbey. For the first time plaques were presented to departing players who had represented the Vodafone Warriors at NRL level, gold for 100 games or more, silver for 50-99 games and bronze for 1-49. Rapira, the last player presented with his plaque, received a standing ovation from the 600 guests in attendance.

A number of milestones were acknowledged including Johnson receiving his 100-game ring for becoming the 23rd player to reach 100 appearances for the Vodafone Warriors while a special presentation was made to wing Manu Vatuvei who this season became the first player in the competition's history to score 10 tries or more in 10 consecutive seasons.

Rapira was honoured with the SKYCITY Legacy Award acknowledging his immense contribution to the Vodafone Warriors since his NRL debut in 2006. He finished his 10th and final season with a tally of 173 appearances before continuing his career with Huddersfield in England.

After his heartfelt speech a group of team-mates rose to acknowledge Rapira with a rousing haka.

During the year the Vodafone Warriors ran a poll to pick the People's Choice 20th Anniversary Team. of the team who were able to make last night's event – Meli, Vatuvei, Johnson, Jones, Matulino, Price, Mannering, Wiki and Lillyman.

For the first time the club created the Sir Peter Leitch Member of the Year award. This was presented to Tauranga's Graeme Lee.

Rookie NRL prop Albert Vete was awarded with the Canterbury of New Zealand Clubman of the Year. Besides making 21 appearances in his rookie NRL season, the 22-year-old impressed in his off-field contribution, personifying the club's values.

Centre Signs On

I'M EXCITED by our latest signing, centre Blake Ayshford, who is joining on a two-year contract.

The 27-year-old has 124 NRL games, 104 for the Tigers from 2009 to 2013 and 20 for the Sharks.

Vodafone Warriors head coach Andrew McFadden says: "We're undergoing a thorough process of reshaping our NRL squad. While we're always seeking to create depth and competition, we have also identified the need for more experienced and durable players and Blake will bring those qualities to the club."

Ayshford has generally been used in the centres but also has some NRL experience on the wing, at standoff and loose forward. He played in two finals campaigns with the Tigers in 2010 and 2011, including the play-off the Vodafone Warriors won 22-20 en route to the 2011 grand final.

Finals Wrap-up

Much has been said about the Wayne Bennett coached side's attacking prowess, but this was one where their defence carried the day.

Dogs slay Dragons: A field goal propelled Canterbury to golden-point 11-10 NRL qualifying final win over St George. It just shows how cruel this game can be because Dragons five-eighth Gareth Widdop levelled the scores on the siren with a penalty then went from hero to zero when he kicked out on the full to hand the Dogs field position and gift them the chance to win the game.

Sharks gobble up Bunnies: I was excited to see this one but I can't think why, because there was only ever one team in it. The Sharks, led by the inspirational Paul Gallen, were too good for last year's Premiers, South Sydney. In all honesty, I thought it was actually a pretty poor game, but there will not be a Sharks fan alive who cares.

It's All Gone To Script - Almost

After week one of the finals the sides that finished seven and eight in the regular season are the two sides eliminated. St George can feel a bit unlucky, but Souths were well off the pace.

Brisbane and Melbourne are the two sides who get the week off, and the elimination finals see the Sharks in North Queensland to face the Cowboys, and the Dogs facing the minor premiers the Roosters.

Big Crowds Turn Up To Support Their Teams

It was a new record for attendance at the first week of the NRL finals, with 131,794 people turning up at the four matches. Who knows how many were watching on TV on either side of the Tasman, but you can expect the crowds to keep rolling up at the business end of the season. "A contract is to give security to the club and player," McFadden said. "There has got to be some sort of amicable deal that's done so both parties are happy. When you're moving players on it's not easy, but you try to be open and transparent. Sometimes it works out, sometimes it doesn't."

Bhana captained the NYC and reserve-grade sides and signed a two-year contract last year, and he posted on Instagram that he won't be staying, and saying he was heartbroken never to play in the NRL. "It's been my dream to play for the Warriors and gutted I didn't get a shot to pull on that NRL jersey but if I want to make that dream true I have to move on."

Wrestling The Next Challenge

All the talk is about Jarryd Hayne and American football but Brisbane's Daniel Vidot has had an offer from the WWE, to compete in professional wrestling.

The 25-year-old has been negotiating for a month after attracting the attention of US wrestling talent scouts who believe Vidot has what it takes.

Last year Vidot played 23 times for the Broncos, scoring eight tries, but he fell out of favour with Broncos coach Wayne Bennett and has been restricted to playing in the Queensland Cup.

Moves to other NRL clubs have fallen through and Vidot will fly to America later this month for a three-day trial.

Apparently Vidot has an offer from the Reds to join their Super Rugby squad but he's focusing on making it in the WWE.

Storm Wing To Join Blues

Melbourne Storm wing Matt Duff-

ie has signed a two-year deal to join Super Rugby's Blues.

Blues coach Tana Umaga says he's excited about the Auckland-born former schoolboy rugby standout's arrival. "Matt is a fantastic athlete, and was a highly promising young rugby player. He has developed into an excellent league player at fullback and wing and that experience fits ideally to the role of an outside back in rugby."

Duffie was signed by the Storm as an 18-year-old and has played 61 first grade games since his debut in 2010, scoring 37 tries. He was of course being linked to the Warriors, but that is obviously not going to happen.

Canterbury Bulls v Akarana Falcons

THE ROCKCOTE Canterbury Bulls have taken a huge step towards retaining their NZRL National Premiership crown, notching 34-18 defeat of fellow heavyweights Akarana Falcons in Round 3 at Christchurch's AMI Stadium.

The Bulls scored seven tries to three in a magnificent all-round performance, keeping their unbeaten 2015 record alive after two outings. The Falcons slipped to a record of one draw and one loss.

The Falcons were denied an early try after a clever grubber by five-eighth Morgan Timoti-Cook, with the chasers ruled offside after referee Aaron Donald consulted with his touch judge.

The Bulls capitalised on the let-off, forcing a line drop-out before fullback Erwin Sauni – a three-try hero in the centres last week against Wai-Coa-Bay – floated a beautiful cut-out pass to send winger Sua Ailloilo in for the opening try after 11 minutes.

After withstanding more pressure on their own goalline, the home side extended their lead to 8-0 after a superb backline shift. Centre Matt Sauni delayed his pass beautifully to put winger Jack Mundy outside his opposite Semisi Fotu. Mundy skipped 20 metres down the touchline to score in the right-hand corner.

The Bulls received another gilt-edged opportunity immediately afterwards, marching down-field following a penalty. James Baxendale scored their third try via a determined last-tackle run from dummy-half, but the second-rower's radar was astray again and the score remained 12-0 with 11 minutes remaining until halftime.

The Falcons belatedly hit the scoreboard in the 35th minute after a break by Timoti-Cook, who positioned lock Peni Misinale to dive over near the posts. Halfback Eko Malu slotted the simple conversion to halve the Bulls' lead.

But Canterbury landed a crucial blow just before halftime, with livewire halfback Tevin Arona backing up another powerful burst by Erwin Sauni to score under the posts. Baxendale landed his first successful conversion of the afternoon to send the Bulls into the break with a handy 18-6 lead.

After Aillolo was denied a second try in the early stages of the second stanza via a forward-pass call, Baxendale barged over from close range to bag his second try and extend the Bulls' advantage to 16

points.

Brisbane's Successful Season Adds to the Legend of Wayne Bennett





AYNE BENNETT was already renowned as one of the greatest rugby league coaches the game has seen before the start of this season. The way that he has converted the Brisbane Broncos back in to a genuine Premiership contender in 2015 has now added to his legendary status.

The Broncos' uncompromising victory over North Queensland at the weekend now has them as the bookies' favourite to win the NRL and their defensive effort at the weekend demonstrated the type of character Bennett's been able to train into this 'new-Broncos' culture within a remarkably short period of time.

When talking about their defence after Saturday's match, Bennett said "The [players] buy into it and at the end of the day they drive it and I just facilitate it."

Bennett's statement is very modest - when to most onlookers it appears that the Broncos players have bought in to his return to the club - which has therefore THEN made their turnaround in fortunes in all aspects of their game (especially their defence) possible.

Not everyone was initially convinced that going 'Back to the Future' by bringing Bennett back to the club would be the best thing for the club to move forward. However, as the season has progressed it's become apparent that he hasn't lost the midis touch that saw Brisbane win 6 Premierships with him at the helm between 1988 and 2008.

Bennett's banning of mobile phones at training is one of the more obvious examples of the type of 'old-school' values that he insists upon that help him to secure respect and results from his players.

"Phones are the greatest distraction of all time," Bennett told members of the media prior to the start of this season.

"When you are trying to build teams mobile phones have no part to play. One guy is trying to talk to another guy and he is looking at his data or his messages. It does not work.

Young men need discipline and direction. When they don't get it you get absolute chaos in the organization," he said.

Many players - including Darius Boyd who Bennett bought back to the club with him - have referred to him as a 'father figure.' His knack for treating players as individuals and taking genuine interest in their lives outside of football are what has helped to see him viewed as more than just a coach to so many young men and make him the great coach he is today.

The phone rule is just one of many that Bennett has bought back to Brisbane. He's even bought in a small but significant rule about players paying for lost gear. A common theme that is clear regarding so much of what Bennett is trying to impart on his players is that they need to be accountable for their actions and communicate well on and off the park.

A team's defence often says a lot more about the culture of a team than their attack - and the way the Broncos' defence has improved this season remains as strong indication as anything that many of Bennett's values have rubbed off on the players.

Early in the season they were a long shot – paying \$18 to win the NRL at one stage. Now they are favorites for the title paying \$3.50. If they do go all the way it will rank right up there with Wayne Bennett's very greatest achievements in a remarkable coaching career.



RTS A Challenge For The Warriors

A USTRALIAN RUGBY league legend Andrew Johns recently predicted Roger Tuivasa-Sheck would evolve into New Zealand's finest rugby league player. Johns was referring only to our country's gifts to his country's club competition. His fellow panel members backed him up by tossing in a few names, Jones, Williams, Graham.

New Zealand's influence on Australian club footy was initially largely provided by bulky blokes who could bullock their way upfield – Bill Noonan, Henry Tatana, Dane Sorensen, Brent Todd and company – so the Aussie fancy dans could capitalise on their momentum and score the headline-grabbing tries.

In recent years we have given their game much more than that. There have been any number of outstandingly skilful second-row and loose forwards, wings and fullbacks. Nigel Vagana, Manu Vatuvei and Shaun Kenny-Dowall have all run in more than 100 tries. We still need to produce more hookers and halves for our own good.

RTS has indeed been a revelation in his first season as the Sydney Roosters fullback after serving a perfect apprenticeship on the wing. He was a star in his own right in 2013, sharing in a Grand Final triumph and being named Dally M Wing of the Year and International Wing of the Year.

At the World Cup in Britain he scored eight tries in six appearances but broke down with a serious leg injury early in the final. Since then he has played in two Anzac Tests for a win and a loss but pulled out of the 2014 Four Nations because of "burn out". We look forward to him emulating his record-breaking metre-eating for the Kiwis in England in November.

So who does RTS have to surpass to become New Zealand's finest player in Australian club football? Johns and his cohorts mentioned Mark Graham, Stacey Jones and Sonny Bill Williams, and they were certainly at the top of their game in their respective decades.

Graham was named New Zealand's Player of the Century in 2007 and thoroughly deserved the honour. Between 1981 and 1988 he made 146 appearances for North Sydney and in many of those carried the Bears on his own broad shoulders. But despite his efforts he could not get Norths through to a Grand Final, let alone a premiership. On the international stage Graham was without peer, the finest second-rower of his time.

At club level, Jones went one better than Graham by spearheading the Warriors into their first Grand Final, even scoring a sensational try to give them a brief second-half lead. He was also inspirational in the Kiwis jersey, playing in 46 Tests and amazingly circling the world in 2005 to attend the birth of his son in Auckland and win the Tri-Nations final at Leeds.

I still vividly remember SBW's stunning 2004 debut for the Bulldogs against Parramatta. He went on to win NRL titles with the Bulldogs and the Roosters. But, before and between his quest for lofty goals in rugby union, boxing and sevens, SBW has been an international rugby league failure. In seven attempts, he never enjoyed success over Australia and, either through injury or by choice, he missed significant Kiwis triumphs in 2005, 2008, 2010 and 2014. His greatness was only at club level and that is where Johns was rating him.

Personally, I would add Ruben Wiki to that list, for his deeds with Canberra (including a premiership) and the Warriors, as both a back and a forward, and for his remarkable 55-Test international career which peaked with that 2005 Tri-Nations triumph as captain.For the record, the Kiwis with most Grand Final appearances are Brent Todd and Steve Matai (four each, two wins apiece).

RTS is about to join the Warriors. Some Australians have already suggested that might not be a smart career move. If he is to realise his immense potential he will need the full support from his team-mates. There are also concerns the New Zealand Rugby Union will offer to fast-track him into the All Blacks and NFL scouts will come knocking. The Warriors need to keep RTS happy and motivated.

Andrew Johns' views deserve respect. But to many on this side of the Tasman the greatest New Zealander in the NRL will be the one who most inspires the Warriors to their maiden Grand Final victory lap on the first Sunday in October.
